no continuing city." We left Georgia, and went to Charles-Town, where it was intended I should be put apprentice to fome trade. Some time after I had been in Charles-Town, as I was walking one day, I passed by a school, and heard music and dancing, which took my fancy very much, and I felt a ffrong inclination to learn the mufic. I went home, and informed my fifter, that I had rather learn to play upon mufic than go to a trade. She told me fhe could do nothing in it, until fhe had acquainted my mother with my defire. Accordingly the wrote a letter concerning it to my mother. which, when the read, the contents were difape proved of by her, and the came to Charles-Town to prevent it. She perfuaded me much against it, but her periualions were fruitless. Disobedience either to God or man, being one of the fruits of fin, grew out, from me in early buds. Finding I was let upon it, and refolved to learn nothing elfe, fhe agreed to it, and went with me to fpeak to the man, and to fettle upon the best terms with him the could. He infifted upon twenty pounds down, which was paid, and I was engaged to ftay with him eighteen months, and my mother to find me every thing during that term. The first day I went to him he put the violin into my hand, which pleafed me much, and, applying clofe, I learned very fast, not only to play, but to dance alfo; fo that in fix months I was able to play for the

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
