## A LETTER.

New-York, 20th Nov. 1794.

MY DEAR FRIEND,

\* INCE I had the pleasure of writing § S § to you from this city, in which I gave you a particular description of the lands in this State, and in the State of Pennsylvania, together with the mode of settlement, and the manner in which they are to be purchased, I have made a tour through the province of Upper Canada, and shall endeavour to give you a particular and impartial account of that country, so far as I have travelled through it, with its laws, government, and commercial advantages. In my letter from Albany, I mentioned that I went to that city by water, from thence I proceeded to Schenectady, fifteen miles, by stage. Schenectady is a handsomely situated little town, on the banks of the Mohawk river, inhabited mostly by Low-Dutch; but from the appearance of the place, one would imagine it a deserted village, the houses being generally
