Heavy Scot Loss in England.

On a coal consumption of 182,000,000 tons in the United Kingdom, there is a loss in soot of at least 2,420,000 tons. This was the estimate given by Prof. 5. B. Cohen and A. G. Ruston at a late meeting of chemists in Leeds, and is based on determinations showing a minimum loss in soot of 0.5 per cent. of the 100,000,000 tons of coal used in factories, and a minimum of six per cent. on the 32,000,000 tons burned in domestic fires.

tic fires. Various experiments have shown an average deposit of soot over the whole of Leeds of at least 220 tons annually per square mile. There is a great con polluted, however, and glass plates exposed in the centre of Leeds became coated with about twenty-four times as such tarry soot as in a locality nine iles away.

The black deposit covers vegetation with a kind of varnish, checking transpiration and assimilation, eighty per cent. of the stomata of the leaves of some conifers becoming completely choked with tar. The solid particles, noreover, diminish the sunlight, and in
