MR. WEAVER HOLDS HIS JOB

Parks Committee Settled the Matter at the Meeting Held Last Evening.

BOARD OF GOVERNORS FOR PARKS

Was Discussed, But Laid Over—Meeting of Methodists—Death of J. H. Park—General News.

Hamilton, Sept. 27.—(Special.)—At the Parks Committee meeting this afternoon the appointment of a caretaker for Dundurn Park came up. On motion of Ald. Burkholder, seconded by Ald. Nicholson, it was resolved to appoint Samuel Weaver, the present caretaker, at a salary of \$80 per month and a free house, to act under Park Superintendent Duncan.

Major Deetz brought up the proposal to place all the city parks under a Board of Governors. Ald. Burkholder and Ald. Teneyck expressed themselves in favor of the plan.

Ald. Board set his face against it as not being as good as the old committee system. The question was left over for further consideration.

Engineer Wingate reported that the piece of land at the west end of Victoria Park was worth, by valuation, \$150,000. Ex-Mayor Tuckett's offer for it, \$150,000, he considered as the next meeting.

The committee held over the requests of the Wentworth Historical Society and Hamilton Association for the use of a portion of Dundurn Castle.

infantry, a hussar regiment, two field batteries, one mountain battery and a detachment of engineers.

The kind of rifles are now equipped at Lady Smith and the 5th Lancers are arriving there.

Trouble With Drivers.—The authorities have been unable to overcome the trouble with the Cape drivers, who refuse to accompany the mountain batteries to the front from Lady Smith, which is one of the bases of operations.

An armored train, hurriedly completed at Cape Town, left there at midnight for Lady Smith. It consists of a powerful engine with a three-quarter inch boiler, a tender and three 20-ton cars. The whole outfit is painted khaki color, is lopsided, carries rifles and a machine gun, and is capable of carrying 250 men.

The Transvaal Government has failed in an attempt to disarm 10,000 sacks of wheat here, but Boer agents are securing South Africa to buy campaign provisions.
