Vancouver Island, B.C., gave rise to considerable novel discussion. The stock was cut down from \$10,000,000 to \$5,000,000,because the stocking of the railway at the rate of \$70,000 per mfie was considered abnormal. A clause having the effect, as Mr. Maclean said, of giving the company power to give away all the stock and build the road on the bonds, was struck out. Another clause related to bonding the road by sections, and was vigorously opposed. It was dropped.

Had the company applied for a charter from the British Columbia Legislature, a clause prohibiting Chinese and Japanese labor would have been insisted on. It was decided to let the matter stand till the next meeting of the committee, but not before Mr. Flint gave notice that he would move that the Chinese labor clause should be added to all British Columbia railway charters.


