AT OSBOODE HALL.

Wm. Taylor's Motion for a Mandamus to Move Junction Small-Pox Hospital Stands Over.

William Taylor's motion for a mandamus to compel the town of Toronto to remove the small-pox hospital from within a distance of 150 yards of his dwelling, in keeping with the terms of the Public Health Act, was adjourned till Tuesday next.

Using the Toronto Railway. The action of George Desbary against the Toronto Railway Company was yesterday set down for trial at the county court.

Daniel Ungar of Napanee is appealing to the Court of Appeal from the judgment rendered against him by Chief Justice Armour last November, condemning him to pay \$2,000 and costs to Charles E. File and wife of the Township of Frederictonburg, for having negligently run into them while driving along the highway.

The Divisional Court, composed of Chancellor Boyd and Justices Ferguson and Robertson, yesterday dismissed George W. Harrison's appeal from the judgment of Chief Justice Meredith, condemning him to pay \$1,000 to William Allan for the seduction of the latter's daughter.

The Court of Appeal heard the appeal yesterday of W. E. Wellington from a judgment of Mr. Justice Robertson, ordering him to pay to A. D. Bowman of Lincoln Township, Lincoln County, \$450 damages for selling him 175 peach trees, which were not of the variety advertised.

In the County Court. Judge Morton yesterday afternoon dismissed the County Court action of C. A. Mitchell, against the Industrial Exhibition Association, Mitchell sued to recover \$200 damages for alleged breach of contract.

In the Criminal Sessions last night acquitted James Ross of the charge of throwing carbolic acid with intent to disfigure Miss Jennie Moffatt of 64 1/2-street on Jan. 12 last.

In the Surrogate Court. George William Ashwell of Petrolia made application in the Surrogate Court yesterday for power to administer the estate of the late Frederick Dixon Ashwell, the street car conductor, who was killed by a street car in the opposite direction, about two weeks ago.

In the Police Court. The Police Court yesterday the four charges against the Street Railway Company of failing to provide rear ventilators on the cars were called, and again adjourned for a week.

Thomas Allen was committed to jail for two months for stealing from brass valves from E. J. Marshall & Co.

John Connors pleaded guilty to a charge of vagrancy, and was given 60 days in jail, work on a charge of assaulting his wife.

Christopher G. Vallean of 31 Carlton-street will be tried today, on a charge of practicing medicine and surgery by operating upon Archibald Duncan.

DEFINE PASSENGER RATES.

An Amendment Which Mr. Maclean Will Move on the Third Reading of the C. P. R. Bill.

A VANCOUVER ISLAND RAILWAY, Which It Was Attempted to Overstock-B. C. Member Objects to Employment of Chinese.

Ottawa, March 15.—(Special.)—In the Railway Committee this morning, Mr. W. F. Maclean gave notice that when Bill No. 31, respecting the C.P.R., came up for a third reading he would move an amendment defining the passenger rates on the main line and branches.

Using the People's Money. The proposition of the Comox and Cape Scott Railway Company, to operate an over-land route, gave rise to considerable novel discussion.

But it remained for Mr. McInnes to provide an innovation, the like of which the committee had never seen. He proposed that a clause be added to the charter to the effect that no Chinaman should be employed in the construction of the road.

He stated that the company was the same that built a railway on the island, 74 miles long, got a cash subsidy of \$750,000 and a grant of about one-half the island, and had employed foreign labor and crowded the island with Chinamen.

The Grand Valley Railway bill aims to build a line 18 miles long, from Port Dover to Goderich, and promising to give the people of that district cheaper coal and better telephone service.

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WHAT THE RED CROSS LADIES SAY. They Ask for a Supply of Extra Underclothing for the Canadian at the Front.

The Ladies' Toronto Red Cross Committee provide for those men who are in active service, and whose future well-being greatly depends upon every effort being made to supply them with suitable "comforts."

Mr. Rodrick Cameron of New York has offered to send all packages for the Canadian troops free of charge by a ship sailing from New York to Halifax in ten days.

The three seasons in Africa has begun, and also they have very hot nights and very hot days. Our men have already felt the need of an extra supply of underclothing.

England is sending out reinforcements of clothing for the men already on active service. The danger of illness arising from exposure to the elements cannot be greatly lessened by proper handkerchiefs, caps and shoes.
