The excessively hot weather has caused one dulness in wholesale trade at Mont-The excessively hot weather has caused some dulness in wholesaic trade at Mont-real, and the usual midsummer conditions now prevail. There has been some in-quiry for seasonable lines to sort stocks, and fail orders have been fair all thigs considered. There is a good deal of acti-vity in shipping circles and large quanti-ties of freight are arriving for shipment from this port. The crop reports, being re-assuring, make business men and bankers hopeful of a large movement in stupie goods the coming fail. Country remit-tances are only fair at the moment, but they are expected to improve very sont-values of staple goods are generally steady to firm. There is a good demand for money and rates are steady. At Quebec the intense heat in the early part of the week somewhat retarded busi-ness, particularly the retail trade; the only purchasing done was for absolute ne-cessity. In shipping circles very lizitie forms an important factor in the ship-ments from this port. The small business done is attributed to the low prices for humber prevailing on the other side of the Atlantic. Some of the large shippers, ex-




