ARDOR OF CUBANS

Insurgents Incline to Seek Shelter in Armistice— Taft's Proposals.

Havana, Sept. 24.—Heavy rains are revailing and the insurgents are inclined to seek the shelter of the armistice during the continuance of the peace negotiations. Heretofore there was merely a verbal agreement without any definite terms, but a document was prepared and taken yesterday to Bocker-Well, I suppose as many die the camps of Gens. Guerra and Castillo, and these chiefs attached their signatures to it.

The document was signed today by acting Secretary of the Interior Montalvo, in behalf of the Government.
