



OF GREELEY ARCTIC CREW

Peabody, Mass., Jan. 29.-George A. White, the last survivor of the Greelev relief expedition to the Arctic in 1880. died here yesterday. He was a memper of the party on the steamer Porteus. When the vessel was crushed in the ice Mr. White and six others rowed 22 days in a small boat until they succeeded in reaching the warship Yantic, which had accompanied the Porteus as far north as it could,
