100 BOYS REGISTER

Answer Call of S. O. S. in Good Shape Through High School Club.

"S. O. S." calls for boys to go on farms for the summer months have brought a registration of more than 100 boys during the past two days. These boys have signed up with the campaign committee of the Y. M. C. A. High School Club.

The campaign has been successfully carried out by the High School Club. It was to have ended last night, but owing to its great success it was continued for another day or two. The names of all boys who registered will be handed to E. G. Davis, director of boys' work of the Y. M. C. A., and will later be filed at the local office of the Ontario Government Employment Bureau.

NEW DEPOT HERE FOR RETURNED SOLDIERS

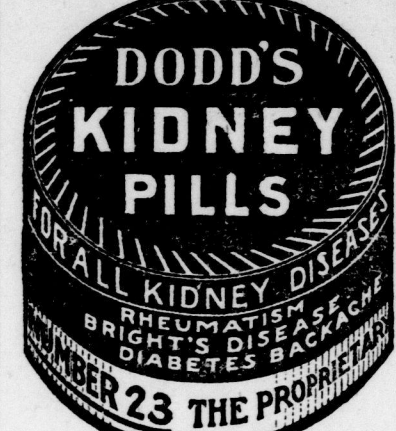
Brig.-General L. W. Shannon, G.O.C. Military District No. 1, wrote to the board of education yesterday afternoon, asking the board to turn over the new technical school to the militia authorities, that the board take it for the duration of the war, paying a substantial rental for the building, or if the city did not wish to do so, the board would lease it until this fall. It is the intention of opening up a new depot here for returned men, and more accommodation is urgently needed for returned men.

The board held a special meeting yesterday afternoon to deal with the matter, and referred it to the industrial advisory committee to deal with. The matter will be taken up at once and a definite conclusion arrived at.

WASHINGTON, March 21.—Construction of ten ships of 15,000 tons each, to be the biggest cargo carriers in the American merchant marine, has been recommended by Chairman Hurley of the shipping board and work on the designs was begun today.



1,500 MEN NEEDED FOR SPRING WORK ON FARMS HERE

Few, However, Have So Far Answered Call.

According to information given out today by H. T. Tait, district representative of the Ontario Employment Bureau, and R. A. Finn, district representative of the Ontario Department of Agriculture, at least 1,500 men are needed to assist in spring planting on Western Ontario farms.

Every effort is being made to secure these men by holding out special inducements in the form of the highest monthly wages ever offered for farm help in this province. The call is for men experienced in farm work, single men preferred, but few are making application.

Farmers ask that single men only be sent, as they have, in the majority of cases, no facilities for providing accommodation for a man with a family. The average wage offered is about \$10 a month with board included. At this figure but few single men have applied for work on district farms.

At the special meeting of the county council held on Saturday afternoon suggestions will be asked as to how best to induce men to return to the land and assist in the greater production movement.

County Clerk John Stuart expressed the opinion today that if the Government would agree to pay the single men the difference between their present wages and that offered by the farmers there would, he believed, be no difficulty in securing the necessary number.

An urgent appeal to men to assist in the greater production movement was made on Sunday by all the city clergymen.

CLONDIKE TRAILS OF OLD AND TODAY ARE SHOWN BY LECTURER

Bible society Secretary Shows Interesting Views.

A series of slides illustrated the lecture given in Talbot Street Baptist Church on Thursday evening by Rev. R. J. Bowen, secretary of the Western Ontario Bible Society, on "The Grandeur of the Glaciers, a Trip Through Alaska."

ACCUSE GUARD, WHO CAUSED ALARM, OF BEING INTOXICATED

The Investigators of Military Shooting Laid Complaint.

COURT-MARTIAL IS ON

Charge of Being Drunk On Duty Being Officially Investigated.

Charged with being drunk at his post while a sentinel on active service, Pte. Harold F. Cowan of No. 1 Special Service Company pleaded not guilty before a district court martial at the armories today.

The case is an outcome of an incident which occurred early in the morning of February 17, when a number of shots were fired by the guard on duty at the King street ordnance stores, between Talbot and Ridout streets. An alarm was sent in, and city and military police responded, and the charge was laid.

Investigation by the court, laid under section 6, sub-section 1 (k) of K R and O, that Pte. Cowan, one of the guards concerned in the affair, was drunk at the time.

Major J. C. Mistle of the 1st Depot Battalion, W. O. R., is president of the court, and Major R. E. Bishop, C.R.C., is the prosecutor. The court was constituted on the application of Major W. J. Douglas of No. 1 Special Service Company.

Lieut. G. A. Gerald of No. 1 Special Service Company is acting for the prosecution, and Lieut. S. Kirkland of the 1st Depot Battalion is acting as counsel for the accused.

The witnesses for the prosecution were heard today. They included Major Osborne, P.M., who told of investigating the affair, and being told that Pte. Mills and Pte. Cowan had done the shooting, six rounds in all being fired.

Both Major Osborne and Patrolman Alex. Towle, the next witness, swore that they detected the smell of liquor on the breath of the accused. Patrolman W. Hunter was also called, in addition to a number of members of the military police and members of the guard in question.

The sittings continued throughout the day. According to the regulations the findings of the court on the completion of the sittings will not be divulged until submitted to Ottawa and approved.
