

BRITAIN TIGHTENS STRANGLE HOLD ON HUN THROAT

Washington Approves New British Regulations Which Cuts Off Supplies To Central Powers Through Scandinavian Nations and Holland—Increases Pressure On Strangle Grip Held By The Allies.

Washington, Oct. 3.—Great Britain's new embargo on shipments of practically everything to Sweden, Norway, Denmark and the Netherlands is regarded here as a most important move in strengthening the cordon which slowly but surely is killing the military power of Germany.

Coming close on the export embargo of the United States which is being administered to keep from the European neutrals everything that might supply the Central Powers, Great Britain's action is regarded as one of the most important of the war.

As the British embargo excludes everything except printed matter, about the only thing that will be permitted to go the German people by way of the neutrals will be expressions of opinion that they should reorganize their system of government to do away with the military autocracy.

In a figurative sense Great Britain holds one end of the rope and the United States holds the other. Gradually but surely it is being drawn that the military power of Germany is being strangled because the embargo is being received through the adjacent neutrals.

PS HARD HIT GREAT STORM AND TIDAL WAVE
Thousands of Buildings Are Destroyed by Typhoon and Flood.

40,000 ARE HOMELESS
Three-Million-Dollar Damage Done at Tokio—Scores Killed.

Tokio, Oct. 3.—The most destructive typhoon and flood in twenty years today had destroyed thousands of buildings, rendered many roads and shipping lanes impassable and done three million dollars damage in the city of Tokio alone. At least eighty are dead.

Storm Broke Monday.
The storm broke Monday. It struck the coast of Japan and moved westward along the coast. The whole area was inundated. A small tidal wave accompanied the wind and rain. At Yokohama Harbor four cargo boats were swept under by this wave of water. Eighty dead in Tokio.

A complete estimate of the damage or of the loss of life will be impossible for several days. The official estimate is at least eighty dead in Tokio alone. Newspapers predict this figure will be doubled.

The telegraph system is utterly demoralized and reports of loss of life or damage in other parts of the empire are lacking. The Sumida River is still rising, and it was predicted today that 20,000 additional homes will be flooded in the Tokio district.

Roofs Stripped Off.
The hurricane stripped roofs off buildings, whipped ships from their moorings and beat the downpour of rain into a veritable flood of water in the streets. The imperial palace buildings suffered considerably. So did many other beautiful structures in the city. Train service is practically at a standstill. The stock exchange was closed all day today.

PRESIDENT'S SON-IN-LAW TARGET FOR GUNNERS WHILE VISITING FRONT
An Atlantic Port, Oct. 3.—Francis B. Sayer, son-in-law of President Wilson, and his narrow escape from Austrian snipers while visiting a portion of the front in Italy, was reported today by the Associated Press. He had been in France and Italy in the autumn of 1916 and in the summer of 1917.

Mr. Sayer was accompanied by several British and American Y. M. C. A. men. Mr. Sayer was visiting the front when, as they were about to cross a bridge, they were fired at by Austrian snipers. The last of which were fired within 50 feet of the party. He heard that Italian officers were firing at them back into the auto.

FRENCH BOMB BADEN CITY IN REPRISAL

Republic Filers Continue To Pay Enemy Back In Their Own Coin.

Paris, Oct. 3.—Continuing their reprisals for attacks of German airmen on French cities, French aviators last night dropped bombs on the German town of Baden, the war office announced. The statement follows: "On the night of October 1-2 and during the day of October 2 our aviators bombed the railway stations at Erlenbach, factories at Volklingen and Hofenbach and railway stations at Brühl, Longuey, Metz-Wolp, Arnville, Metz-les-Bains, Thionville and Sarrebourg. In the course of these various expeditions, projectiles to the amount of 7,000 kilograms (15,400 pounds) were dropped."

The town of Baden, in the Grand Duchy of the same name, is one of the most famous and beautiful watering places of Europe, best known for its medicinal baths. It is a town of some 15,000, about 55 miles from the French border.

General Hodgins To Aid Demobilization; Left For England
Selected As a Member of the Imperial Joint Committee.

Ottawa, Oct. 3.—Gen. Hodgins, formerly adjutant-general of the Canadian army, left for England today on his way to London, England, to take up his duties as a member of the joint committee on demobilization. The committee was formed under the chairmanship of Sir Hugh Allan, to deal with difficulties in the way of a speedy repatriation of the overseas forces, and to formulate plans for demobilization when peace is declared.

Gen. Hodgins was chosen as a Canadian representative on the committee. Gen. Hodgins will be accompanied overseas by Mrs. Hodgins.

NO PROPOSALS MADE FOR SEPARATE PEACE IS GERMAN DENIAL
Foreign Secretary Replies to Statement of Russ War Minister.

Amsterdam, Oct. 3.—Germany has made no proposals whatever for a separate peace either to France or Great Britain. Dr. von Kuehlmann, the German foreign secretary, makes this announcement, according to an official statement received here from Berlin, in answering the speech made by Gen. Verkhovskiy, the Russian minister of war, before the Democratic Congress in Petrograd. The statement reads:

"Gen. Last month reports were circulated in Russia that France and Great Britain had received offers from Germany to make peace at the expense of Russia. They became so insistent that the Russian Government obtained from France and Great Britain formal denials that they would make peace with Germany.

THE WAR SITUATION
"We shall bomb Germany with compound interest," Premier Lloyd George declared in the House of Commons as he declared to a London crowd in promising that Great Britain would soon launch reprisals for the many German air raids.

The French reprisals, already under way, were continued last night. French airmen dropped bombs on the town of Baden, some 55 miles beyond the French frontier. More than seven tons of bombs also were dropped on various military objectives in German-held territory.

Along the French front the artillery duels were vigorous at many points. The activity was especially marked north of Verdun, where the French are apparently preparing an attack to recover a few trench elements which the crown prince's troops retained when their main attack on the Meuse was repulsed north of Hill 344 yesterday. A German attempt to attack east of Rheims was broken up by the French yesterday.



GERMANY WILL BE BOMBARDED WITH COMPOUND INTEREST, SAYS LLOYD GEORGE TO LONDON POOR

While Visiting Damaged District, British Premier Promises Germany Will Be Paid Back Soon For the Recent Raids—Western German Points Prepared For Attacks.

London, Oct. 3.—England has about decided today that once again it must fight the German with the Boches' own weapons of frightfulness. The public demand for reprisals over German cities for the work of German airmen over London and coast counties, had approached the point of a nationwide cry. Authoritative reports today had it that the Government was practically ready, awaiting only the decision of the military authorities to put a formidable reprisal program into force. In the meantime London awaits each night with the belief that the raiders will again come on their baby-killing expeditions. The city confidently expected a raid last night. The streets were almost deserted, and cellars had been made ready for occupancy. But the Germans did not appear.

London, Oct. 3.—A crowd of poor people in the southwest district of London yesterday appealed to Premier Lloyd George, says the Daily Mail, for reprisals against Germany for the air raids on London. The premier shouted to the crowd:

"We will give it all back to them, and we will give it to them soon. We shall bomb Germany with compound interest."

The crowd cheered the premier's promise wildly. The premier had just completed a tour of the area damaged in the raids with Viscount French, commander of the home forces.

RAIDS IN WEST GERMANY.
Amsterdam, Oct. 3.—The German military authorities have issued orders for the bombardment of the Dutch town of Dusseldorf and a great portion of Westphalia must be darkened at night according to the general order. Similar precautions against air raids in the Netherlands and other places in Western Germany.

TO COUNTERACT RAID.
London, Oct. 3.—That the British Government contemplates some new and effective steps to counteract German air raids on England is borne out by a speech made by Sir Francis Lloyd, director of the defenses of London, and Dr. Christopher Addison, former minister of munitions, in a meeting in the London district last night called to discuss the recent raids.

NATURALIZED AMERICANS THREATENED WITH FAMINE IN TURKISH PROVINCES
A Stockholm, Oct. 3.—The matter of being naturalized Americans is becoming most acute in Syria and Palestine, according to reports received by United States officials here. The reports say that more than two hundred Americans are threatened with death by starvation in these provinces. Condition in Smyrna is better, although there are some reports that Robert College has 300 students, and the Girls' College has an attendance up to its full capacity.
