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ENEMY SHIPS GOLD TO SOUTH AMERICA

New York Financiers Say Ger-
mans Prepare for War
With United States.

SELL ALL SECURITIES

Part of Metal Coinage Sent to
Spain Belongs to the
Huns.

New York, Feb. 8.—Gold coin to the
amount of \$1,100,000 has been with-
drawn from the sub-treasury for ex-
port to South America and \$500,000
has been taken for shipment to Cuba.
A new light is now shed upon the
motive for the steadily continued ex-
port of gold from New York to Chile,
Argentina and other South American
countries. These exports have been
steadily continued in the face of rates
for insurance and war risks that
would ordinarily be regarded as pro-
hibitive. Another circumstance which
is now made clearer is the fact that
there has been no attempt at inter-
ference with the vessels carrying the
gold. The opinion was general again
yesterday that the movement to South
America for at least a number of
weeks past has been for German ac-
count. It will be recalled that Ger-
many has been credited with having liq-
uidated a very large amount if not the
greater part of its securities and other
interests in Great Britain, the United
States, France and other countries
previous to the outbreak of the Euro-
pean war.

The German far-sightedness may
lead German interests to preparedness
for any possible restrictions that
might be placed in this country upon
allies from belligerent countries in
the event of war between the United
States and Germany. The presump-
tion is that Germans may believe that
their interests would be more secure
in some of the South American coun-
tries. It has also been considered by
financial experts that part of the gold
shipped to Spain until recently was
really for the account of Germany
owing to the seclusion of the central
nations from outside communications.

ENDS SPECULATION IN
OCEAN GOING VESSELS
Wilson's Proclamation Regarding
Shipping Has an Immediate
Effect.

Washington, Feb. 8.—Following the
proclamation of President Wilson to
the shipping interests of the United
States it became known today that the
sale and transfer of ocean-going ves-
sels has virtually ceased. While the
president made use of the power vest-
ed in him under the new shipping law,
it was feared that certain shipping
interests might question the authority
and embarras the administration by
taking the matter into court.

It has been a source of gratification
to the government that no such ac-
tion has been taken, and that ship-
builders and shipowners without ex-
ception have shown their intention of
wholeheartedly supporting the ad-
ministration.

Because of the hazardous situation
in shipping circles the federal war
risk insurance bureau again has in-
creased its insurance rates. Other
increases are likely to be made in a
few days.

CHECK RISE IN PRICE
OF NEWS PRINT PAPER
Manufacturers and Publishers
Have Effected Results by
Co-operation.

Washington, Feb. 8.—The federal
trade commission announced today
that it would send its report of the
news print paper investigation to
congress next Monday. While the
tenor of the report has not been made
public it is understood that the com-
mission will tell in detail how the
manufacturers and publishers together
have succeeded in checking the rapid-
ly soaring prices of news print paper.
It is also understood that the com-
mission will ask for passage of legisla-
tion giving authority intended to pre-
vent any such condition arising in
the future.

CIVIL MOBILIZATION

IS THORO IN FRANCE

Certain Classes May Be Shifted
From Army to Other Work.

Paris, Feb. 8.—Elliott Clemenceau,
minister of commerce and agriculture,
today introduced in the senate a mea-
sure respecting general civil mobiliza-
tion. The salient feature of the bill
is the giving to the government of
the right to mobilize all able-bodied
males between the ages of 16 and 60
now serving in the army, who may be
assigned to such work for the na-
tional defence as their fitness and oc-
cupation make most advantageous.
Farmers or other persons in oc-
cupations directly concerned with the
national defence will be left where
they are now working, under certain
conditions, as will also the public of-
ficials and government employees,
whose services are indispensable in
their present posts.

Alphabetical indexes of persons
subject to be called up will be com-
piled in the offices of the mayors of
every township. They will be made up
by classes, professions and call-
ings.

BELGIANS BEAT HUNS
Drive Off Strong Party From
Post South of
Dixmude.

Paris, Feb. 8.—The official commu-
nication issued by the war office to-
night says:
"Spirited artillery fighting took
place south of the Somme in the re-
gions of Denicourt and Lihons.
The Argonne sector today saw ac-
tion. We carried out against the
German trenches a surprise attack
which enabled us to bring back about
20 prisoners. Nothing of importance
occurred on the rest of the front.
"Enemy aeroplanes dropped projec-
tiles in the region of St. Vincent
bridge. French civilians were killed and
five wounded."

Belgian communication:
"Last night the Germans attempt-
ed to break through the Belgian lines. A
strong enemy party advanced and at-
tacked our post south of Dixmude,
but was received by infantry and ma-
chine gun fire. Our assault was suc-
cessful. The survivors retreating. We
took about a dozen prisoners also.
Numerous dead were left on the field
and the trenches, one of whom was
an officer."

"A German patrol was captured last
night by the French near Bonzein. In
the Verdun sector today's official
communication says. Patrol encoun-
tered occurred during the night in other
parts of the front."
