

POCOCK VIGOROUS IN BECK'S DEFENCE

London and Port Stanley Line
Termed Great Financial
Success.

London, Ont., June 2.—The latest attack of A. B. Ingram of the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board upon Sir Adam Beck and the financing of the London and Port Stanley Railway, brought a rejoinder today from Vice-Chairman Philip Pocock of the London and Port Stanley Commission.

Mr. Pocock asserted that Mr. Ingram was woefully at sea in his observations on the London and Port Stanley Railway bond issues and especially, in the premises of his charge that Sir Adam resorted to wizardry in the preparation of governmental reports.

Mr. Pocock concluded: "Sir Adam Beck, as a patriotic and public-spirited citizen, cannot forward Ottawa his scheme for electrification. Before the road was electrified the people received from the private lessees amounts ranging from \$14,000 to \$17,000 a year. Now the London Railway Commission pays \$20,000 a year rental for the same old property, and in periods during the life of the lease the rental increases until it eventually will be \$50,000. The commission has carried out the electrification and reconstruction of the property in addition, and in the first four years of operation, in addition to paying \$50,000 rent to the city council, paid off debentures, thereby increasing the people's clear equity in the property by \$57,749.95, and earned surpluses of \$98,912.87. That gives the people of London a total actual benefit of \$237,362.82 for the four years. In the fourth year alone the people's profits were \$10,207.45 after all obligations of the commission, including interest and taxes, had been met."

OWN CARELESSNESS KILLS PEDESTRIANS
Speaker So Declares at Automobile Association Annual Meeting.

Winnipeg, Man., June 2.—Seventy-five per cent. of the fatal accidents to pedestrians are caused thru their own fault, according to speakers before the annual meeting of the Canadian Automobile Association, held here today. Statistics were given to show that nearly 80 per cent. of the fatalities on Toronto streets were due to carelessness of the persons killed.

There were between 40 and 50 representatives of the various provincial branches of the motor league present at the meeting, which was preceded by a luncheon.

Questions of common interest to the motorists of the Dominion were discussed, including the standardizing of traffic regulations.

The speakers included G. A. McNamee, secretary of the Automobile Club of Canada, and G. A. Hudson, president of the Ontario Motor League.
