ACCIDENT IN CAR AT SAND POINT

Huge Package Fell and Pinned Him to Car Floor--Ambulance in Use at Time and Sled Took Injured Man to Hospital.

As the result of a bad accident at Sand Point last evening Jack Watts, an English boxer, who has done some work in the local ring, lies in the General Public Hospital with his thigh severely fractured. Watts who is in the employ of the C. P. R. as a trucker, together with other men, was moving packages of plate glass from the wharf through No. 3 shed to cars. The packages were large about 14 by 7 feet, and very heavy. Watts was between a package and the side of the car when the case slipped and toppled over on Watts pinning him to the car floor. With difficulty the package was lifted off and it was found that Watts was badly hurt. He was carried into the office and the ambulance telephoned for. It was found impossible to procure it and it was not until an hour later that an express sled arrived, and Watts was taken to the hospital where it was found that his right thigh was fractured. Late last night the doctors did not anticipate any serious results.

Carleton Tots Thrown from Sled 20 Feet to Bottom of Murchie's Pond.

In a coasting accident yesterday morning in Water street, West End, little Miss Hedgely, aged about seven, and little Miss Irving, about the same age, both living in Market place, were thrown over the wharf to the stones in Murchie's pond, at the foot of Water street. They were somewhat bruised and cut. The little ones were enjoying a coast down the hill, but when nearing the wharf the sled slowed and, sticking with considerable force, threw both below. Had the sled been in both might have been drowned. The Parker child quite severely cut on the forehead. POLICE DEPARTMENT

IMPROVED IN YEAR

Chief Clerk Addresses Men at First Night Roll Call of 1906.

At roll call in central police station last evening Chief Clerk addressed the men. He complimented them on the record of the year and said he saw improvement in the department during the twelve months. The men had worked well. While discipline had been good there had been too many suspensions. Drunkenness had decreased throughout the city, there had been about the same number of cases of petty stealing as in 1905 and the offenders were in the main youthful. There had been less loitering on the streets, as indicated in the reports, and this was a welcome improvement. There had also been changes for the better along other lines of effect upon the men's morals.

There were some improvements in the carrying on of the police work which he hoped for but while the city was under the burden of expense for winter port facilities the sidewalk, though approving of the project, felt they could not very well be carried out. These included the increase and arrangement of the force so as to permit of the men working in three shifts, and also the establishment of a pension scheme.
