

The new devices which are being employed for the first time in any structure were brought to the city yesterday in the caisson piers which form the foundations of the new Singer Building in Broadway, near Liberty street.

They were in charge of the Chief Steward, the son of the Kensington, who had ten assistants. Add to these the crew of the steamer and the Gaspeian's own passengers, the total number is about 1,000.
