The serving of beef and bacon is prohibited on Tuesdays and Fridays, and at more than one meal on any other day. Substitutes, such as corn bread, oat cakes potatoes, etc., must be provided at every meal at which white bread is served Heavy penalties are provided under meal at which white bread is served any term not exceeding three months, Under the order, the expression "bacon" or to both fine and imprisonment.

BIG AIRCRAFT FACTORY FOR AMERICAN NAVY

Plant to Cost \$1,000,000 Will Be Located at Philadelphia Yard.

Washington, Aug. 10—Secretary Daniels has announced the decision of the government to build an aircraft factory for the navy. The cost of the plant, which will be located at the League Island Navy Yard at Philadelphia, will be \$1,000,000 for buildings and machinery. When worked at full capacity, as it will be when completed, the plant will employ 2,000 men.


