



Britain, With Aid of United States, May Prevent Clash, Paper Thinks

British United Press. ONDON, Oct. 9.—The Daily L Express, without quoting its authority, declares that "Mussolini is planning war on Turkey." His object, the newspaper says, is to seize the sphere of interest on the Adalian coast, Asia Minor, which the secret London pact of 1916 promised to Italy, but which pact subsequently was declared null and void. The Turks have mobilized army corps in the threatened area.'

The Daily Express declares that Greece has promised activity to cooperate with Italy; Rumania is understood to have promised to remain neutral; Jugo-Slavia has asked to be permitted to remain neutral.

MUSSOLINI CONFIDENT

Mussolini, the paper says, believes the methods he has devised cannot possthly fail if put into operation. Greece would attack Turkey through Thrace, while the Italians attacked in the south. Greece's reward would be the e-possession of the Smyrna territory.

Rumania's neutrality was secured by a promise of support regarding Bessarabia. Great international efforts are being

made, the Daily Express declares, to persuade Mussolini to desist, and it is urged in some quarters that the United States should be invited to ex-United States should be invited to ex-ert her influence for peace. While France is believed to be not entirely averse to the Italian aims if they can be attained without war, the newspa-per asserts, Great Britain is on the tide of peace and her efforts in peac side of peace and her efforts, in con-junction with possible aid from the United States may limit Mussolini's plans to an unfulfilled threat.


