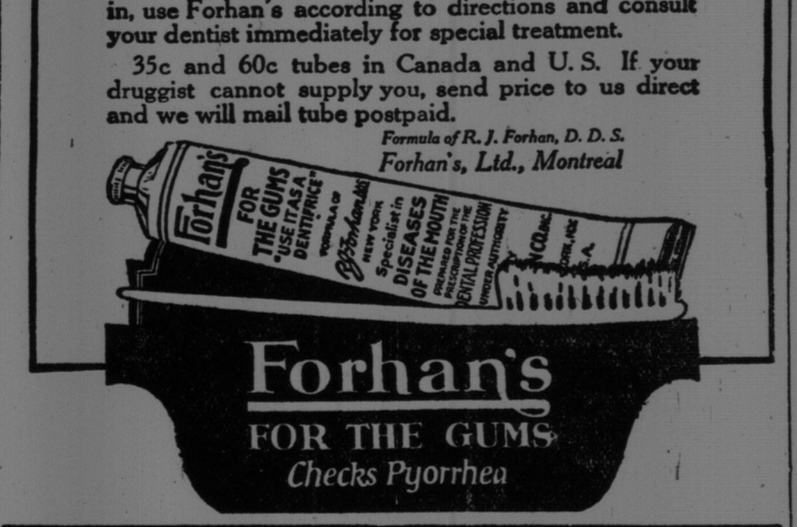

EXPECT MANY TO
ATTEND SWISS FAIR
Melita to Carry Canadian Importers and Exporters from St. John end of Next Week—Passport Matter.

Montreal, April 4—Carl P. Huebscher, Consul General of Switzerland in Canada at Montreal, has officially informed the Canadian Pacific Co., that beginning April 15 the passports of Canadians

traveling to Switzerland will not have to be presented at any Swiss consulate in Canada, as visas will be unnecessary after that date for Canadians, except for those seeking employment in Switzerland.

Mr. Huebscher says that he feels confident that the action taken by the Swiss government will greatly facilitate travel from Canada. This announcement is of special interest in view of the recent statement that it is considered probable that there will be a number of Canadian importers and exporters who will sell on the Canadian Pacific "Melita" for Southampton and Antwerp from St. John, on April 15, to attend the sixth Swiss Sample Fair which will be held in Basle from April 22 to May 2. Switzerland, especially the city of Basle, has been famous for its fairs since the fifteenth century. These local fairs have now been consolidated and the Sample Fair at Basle has become an annual event of international importance since its inauguration in 1917. Here the Swiss exhibitors and the buyers from all parts of the world meet.

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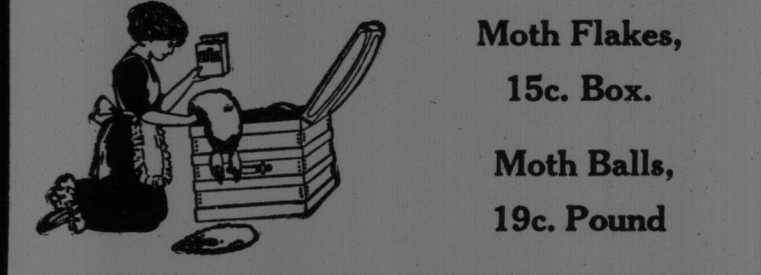
