"CRAMMING" CHILD'S BRAIN.
Professor Sees Too Much "Higher Education" in Schools.

Philadelphia, May 12.—Too much "higher education" in elementary schools was deplored as tending to "crum" eleven-year-old brains" beyond capacity by Philip Marshall Brown, professor of international law at the University of Pennsylvania, in an address before the public conference on training men for foreign commercial service.

The meeting was held under the auspices of the committee of fifteen appointed by the United States Bureau of Education and was preliminary to the opening tomorrow of the National Foreign Trade Convention.

"There is too much being piled into the elementary and high school courses," declared Professor Brown. "Most of us have a mentality of eleven years, any way. Psychologists and sociologists all tell us that this piling in of too much higher education is going to be bad for society in the long run."

Professor James P. Lichtenberger, president of the American Sociological Society; Stephen P. Dugan, director of the Institute of International Education, New York; Wallace W. Atwood, president of Clark College, Worcester, Mass.; and Glen L. Swiggett, head of commercial education in the Federal Bureau of Education, were among the day's speakers.

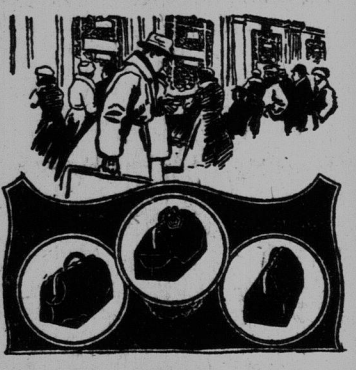

BRONZE AGE HOME NOT ATTRACTIVE

Prehistoric Houses Draughty in Winter, Smoky in Summer, Said Prof. Windle—Methods of Defence.

Notwithstanding the many discomforts and drawbacks which characterize our modern apartment houses, we in the twentieth century have much to be thankful for that our lot was not cast in the neolithic age, for according to Windle, F. R. S., of Toronto University, who lectured on "Prehistoric Man in England" at the Chemistry Building of McGill University, the "bee-hive dwellings" of the bronze age were singularly uncomfortable places of abode, possessing the alternative disadvantages of being cold and draughty or unsanitary and smoke-laden.

The lecture was the second of the series, and the lecturer traced the earliest stages of the bronze age from the time when some aboriginal hunters cooked their meat on stones in England, and the hairy one of the party discovered that the heat of their fire had melted the "stones," forming a malleable and smelt-able metal which was adaptable to their primitive purposes of instrument making. This metal was copper, which was plentiful all through Britain and the continent of Europe, but it was not until later that the discovery was made that by mixing a percentage of tin with the copper a much harder and finer substance was formed which took a keen edge, and was far superior for the primitive purposes of the aboriginals. This was the beginning of the bronze age, and a bronze rod had been found in Egypt as far back as 3000 B. C., but the bronze workings in Britain belonged to a much later period, probably about 1200 B. C. The fact that tin was only to be found in Cornwall necessitated that there must have been a regular route of export from that part of Britain to the Continent, and this theory was supported by many eminent archaeologists.

The lecturer produced specimens of the earliest bronze weapons most of which had been found in Britain, showing the

gradual development of the more elaborate tool containing a socket into which a handle was fitted, instead of being simply tied on with raw hide. A very small sickle found in Switzerland, said Professor Windle, gave rise to much discussion as to why such a tiny instrument should have been used there, until somebody remembered that today the Swiss reapers use a very small sickle beside the corn fields there are so hilly that a larger tool would stick into the earth at every stroke.

The small hillocks to be found in many parts of England and Ireland were the "barrows" or burial places of that age, and these were responsible for the many finds of the pottery of the period. Photographs of many samples of "drinking cups" and "eating vessels" were shown by the lecturer, who pointed out the primitive attempts at art in the form of incised basket work and later on a more elaborate series of curves. Two almost identical photographs of pottery were of particular interest, said the lecturer, as one was made about thirty years ago at Port Moresby in North Australia, and the other one dated back more than 3000 years.

The dwelling places were exceedingly primitive and in many cases consisted merely of hollows burrowed in the earth, with a covering of reeds, but the later type of house was the "bee-hive" hut, which was a more pretentious stone structure, many examples of which were still to be found in England and Ireland. Photographs of some of these still extant in County Kerry showed the simple masonry employed, the stones being piled on each other without any attempt at mortar, and having a kind of chimney or hole at the top. "I presume," said Prof. Windle, "that in winter at any rate these huts had an outer covering of turf to keep out the biting draughts that must have blown through them otherwise, but the alternative smoke and stuffiness cannot have been much of an improvement."

Of particular interest were the ingenious methods employed by the builders of some of these forts against sudden attacks by an enemy. The most commonly employed device was an outer wall having only a narrow entrance easily guarded by a few of the garrison, and when one entered by this door a maze of winding paths presented themselves, leading to a completely contrived trap for the invaders.

This idea, said the lecturer, of prevention against attack was to be found in widely distinct places and ages. In England the tops of mountains were used for the building of forts, which were

surrounded by immense mounds some of which were sixty feet in depth, and which concealed 10,000 men without any trouble. The mounds were filled with water, and the same idea was responsible for the Borneo lake dwellings which are built on piles in the water. Another pair of photographs which presented remarkably similar traits were shown, one depicting a Borneo lake dwelling which had been burned down about forty years ago, and the other a Swiss lake village whose ruins date back some 3000 years. The Swiss ruins had been found to be veritable treasure places for archaeologists, as household articles of the bronze age dropped between the clinks and crevices in these rude structures into the water beneath.

The ideas of the town planners in these Swiss lake villages, said the lecturer, presented an interesting counterpart with those of the Romans, as both had the same idea of streets running at right angles. The exactly similar idea is that of the "block" in the modern American cities.
