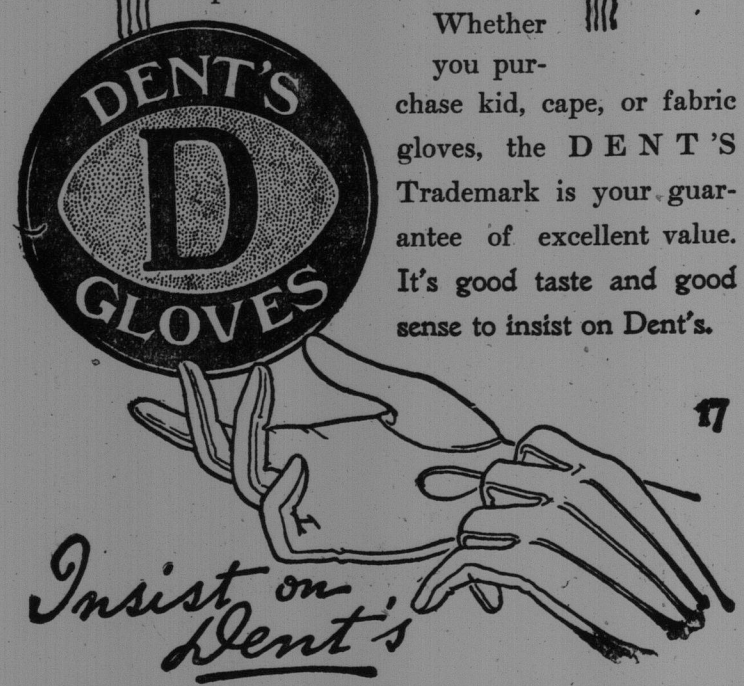

RECENT DEATHS

James Warnock.

The many friends of James Warnock will regret to hear of his death, which occurred Wednesday evening, April 9, at his late residence, 156 Market Place, West End. Mr. Warnock had been ailing for the past few months, but had only been confined to his bed recently. He was in the seventy-first year of his age. For twenty-three years he was employed with the ferry department, but during the latter portion of his life he was in the wood business. He was a very well known citizen of West St. John, and will be missed by a host of friends. He is survived by his wife, four sons, Charles W., of Brookline (Mass.); John P., William C., and J. Gordon, all of the C. P. R., West St. John; and by six daughters, Mrs. A. E. Harris, of Swampscott (Mass.); Mrs. A. Cruikshank, Mrs. Joseph Tibbett, Mrs. J. C. Williamson, all of West St. John; Mrs. W. A. Patterson, of Regina (Sask.), and Miss Grace M., at home.

Rev. J. T. Hazelwood.

Toronto, April 9.—Rev. J. T. Hazelwood, field secretary of evangelism and social service of the Methodist church of Canada, died suddenly today at his home in this city from heart failure. He was born at Brookville (Ont.) and was in his sixty-second year. His wife, one daughter and four sons survive, all the sons having served in the Canadian expeditionary forces.

Rev. Dr. Hazelwood has been pastor of a number of Methodist churches in Ontario, and had occupied the pastorate of two churches in this city.

Mrs. Wade B. Rogers.

The death has occurred in San Jose (Cal.) of Mrs. Wade B. Rogers, formerly Miss C. Annie McG. Hamilton, of Shediac. Mrs. Rogers was a daughter of the late Robert and Elizabeth (Harrington) Hamilton, of Shediac. She is survived by her husband, a brother, William Hamilton, of Shediac, and a sister, Mrs. E. H. Gray, of San Jose. The Misses Margaret and Ada Hamilton, of this city, are nieces, and Frederick H. Glasby, also of St. John, is a nephew.

Mrs. Manning Milton.

Moncton, N. B., April 9.—The death of Mrs. Manning Milton occurred this morning at her residence here after a brief illness of pneumonia. She was thirty years of age and was formerly Miss Lorette of Calhoun (N. B.). She leaves to mourn her husband and little son, her father, being one of the first five brothers. The sisters are Leonie, Moncton, Mrs. A. Bellevue, Manchester (N. B.), and Mrs. R. Weatherbe, Willemdale (N. S.). The brothers are Ramsford, Calhoun's, Wilfred and Marten, overseas, Ernest of St. John, and Eddie at home. A sad feature was the expected arrival of her two brothers at any time from overseas.

Mrs. Virginia Purdy Bacon, widow of Walter Rathbone Bacon, traction magnate of the British Isles, and granddaughter of the late Commodore Cornelius Vanderbilt, died on Monday at her home, 247 Fifth Avenue, New York, of a complication of diseases. She was the youngest daughter of the late Juliette Vanderbilt Lafitte of Bordeaux, and was educated in that city.

Until her marriage to the late Mr. Bacon she lived in Bordeaux. In recent years she had divided her time among New York, London, and Bordeaux. She had been active in philanthropic work since the war, being one of the first to donate to the Red Cross and other war work societies; paintings from the extensive collection of her brother-in-law, the late Edward R. Bacon, for auction and sale.

Mrs. Bacon, who was an accomplished musician, was a patron of painting and music, and had devoted much of her time and money to the advancement of the arts. In the Metropolitan Museum there were recently installed two important works taken from the Bacon collection, being presented in commemoration of her husband and brother-in-law.

Alfred Hamilton died at his home at Hopewell Cape this week. He is survived by his father and mother and two sisters.

Miss Maria Horn died at Coal Creek, Queens county, on April 3. She was a native of Sweden.

Jesse Prescott died on Sunday at his home in Pennfield. He leaves his wife and two daughters.

Funeral of George D. Titus.

The funeral of George D. Titus was held on Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at St. Luke's church. Mr. Titus was the proprietor of the Adams House, Halifax, and is a son of Mr. and Mrs. George W. Titus, of 123 Chesley street. The body arrived in the city from Halifax on Monday, and the funeral was held from his parents' residence. Interment was made in the family plot at Cedar Hill. The funeral was very largely attended, and the Knights of Pythias, St. John Lodge, walked in a body. 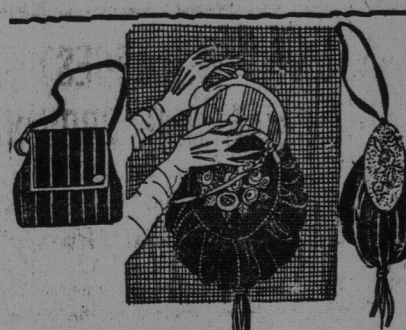

and grandson of James B. Haggin, millionaire mine owner.

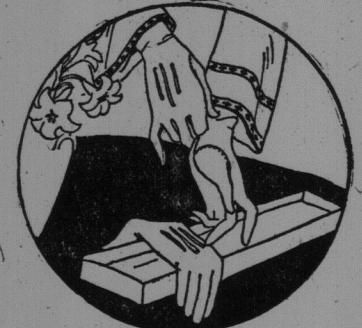

CATHOLIC DRIVE TO HELP FRENCH PARISHES

Ex-Judge Morgan J. O'Brien of New York, has announced that a Catholic drive for \$5,000,000 to rehabilitate French Catholic parishes which were wiped out in the devastated regions of France would be started. The campaign would be conducted under the patronage of Cardinal Gibbons, Cardinal O'Connell of the Archdiocese of Boston, Cardinal Lucon, Cardinal Amadei, Archbishop of Paris, and with the active support of the Most Rev. Patrick J. Hayes, Archbishop of New York.

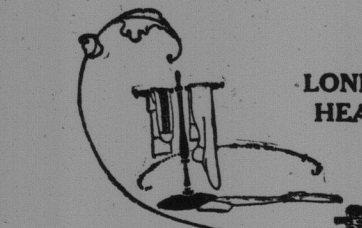
