METAL AND MACHINERY MARKET

In the summary of the iron, steel, metal and machinery markets for week ending June 13, Canadian Machinery and Manufacturing News, Toronto, makes the following comment:-

The closing of the strike which has been in progress for some weeks now in Toronto and some other centres would assist in getting work under way in several places, where operations have been pending the outcome. Some factories, where the business of buying equipment and getting it in shape was in progress, were not seriously inconvenienced by the strike, as the millwrights were able to go ahead with their work without interfering with other operations in the shop. Now that the plant is in shape to go ahead, the strike is looking for operations and retarding production just at a time when it is needed.

There is somewhat of an emergency haste and character about much of the steel and iron business that is being placed now, as one dealer said, "They all want deliveries in about ten minutes." This is not the sort of business either the warehouses or mills like, as it does not help to create the reserve that means something approaching capacity production for the steel mills.

Deliveries on the larger types of general machines are slow, in fact the condition is not as favorable now as some weeks ago. This means that the truss making these machines have had plenty of orders and they have nothing in stock. This condition also tends to keep up the prices. In fact prices are now just about where they were during the war, and only a few recessions have been made.

The trade is inclined to the belief that the steel prices are not going to sag. Support in the way of the fixed and recognized price has been withdrawn, but still the fixed price remains, minus the fringe. Conditions that would break the prices have been prevalent in numbers, but they have not done much mischief. The trade believes that if the steel schedule can withstand the bad months of July and August a buying movement would carry with it a strengthened market. Canadians show considerable interest in the reported purchase of one large lot of plate at \$20, against the prevailing price of 2.65. These concessions are not alarming, as they tend to appease those who did not like the fixed price.

Shipments of Canadian scrap metal are going to the States, but only on contract. Complaints are less frequent on grading and sorting, and this is taken to mean that conditions are better, because whenever there is a glut of material all complaints are numerous. When the market is more anxious for materials the complaints decrease in ratio to the anxiety.

The coroner said after having been shot in the stomach with a revolver. The bullet is said to have been fired by his cousin, James Tom, who has been arrested.

Roy, the four-year-old son of Robt. Robinson, C. N. R. conductor, died in Moncton yesterday after having been struck by an automobile. Another child, Maurice Stratton, nine years old, was seriously injured. George Tom, a Chinese, is in a critical condition in hospital in Amherst, N. S.

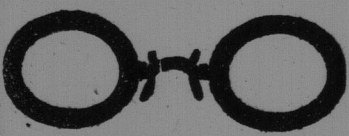

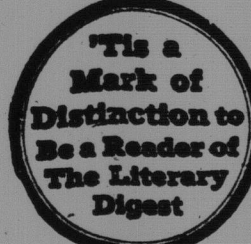
