DR. PUGSLEY ON MILLER CASE

Ottawa, Feb. 21—R. C. Miller, of Montreal, who has been a prisoner of parliament for the last two days, was sentenced last night to imprisonment in the Cretion county jail. Miller was brought before the house yesterday and said his reason for retaining information asked for regarding his payments of \$41,000, was because he was a party.

Hon. Dr. Pugsley, in opposing the motion, pointed out that the statement made by Miller before the public accounts committee, he was not personally concerned in the matter, but he was concerned that the public should be kept in the matter.

Dr. Pugsley noted that the question put by the speaker to the witness did not correctly summarize the evidence taken before the public accounts committee. Miller, according to the printed evidence, had never sworn that he had paid out the \$41,000 to secure government business.

He had sworn that he had received this sum from the company to get business and that he had never paid it to any member of parliament or to any government official, either directly or indirectly.

Apparently a tortured and false statement had been submitted to the house and the members were asked to accept it without further examination. There was not one word in the evidence which justified placing the witness in custody. He was to be condemned for not answering a question which was stated as a fact something which was not a fact.
