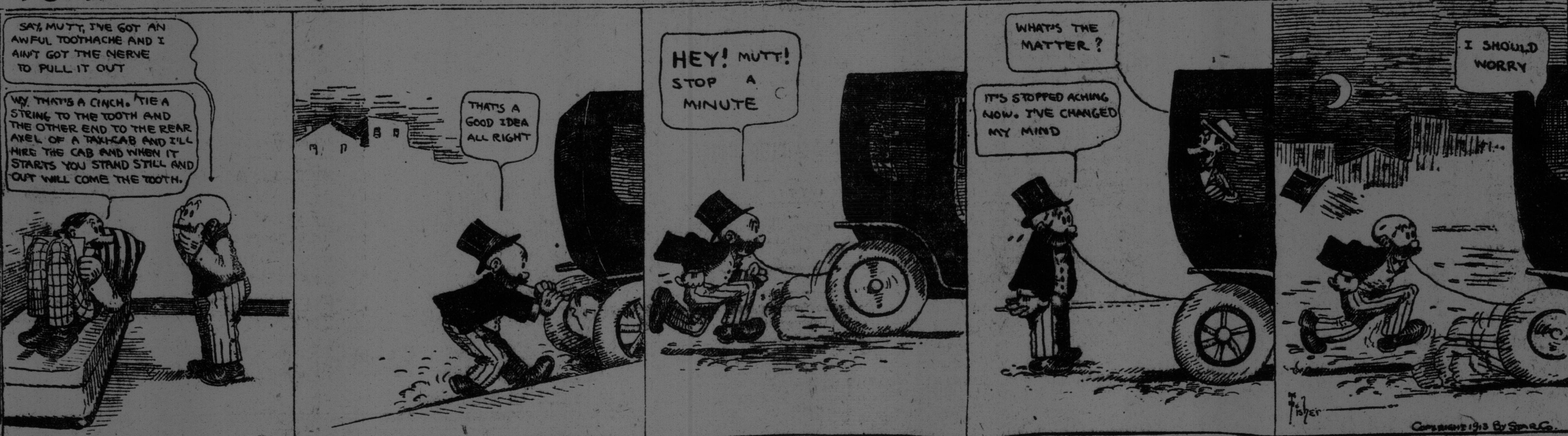

CONFERENCE
ON RING FIGHTS

Medicine Hat, Alta., June 3.—After a lengthy discussion of the fatal result attending the McCarthy-Kelly fight in Calgary, and expressing the view that a great difference existed between amateur and professional boxing bouts, the Alberta conference unanimously passed the following resolution, yesterday: "Moved by Rev. S. E. Marshall of Calgary, seconded by W. H. Clegg of Edmonton, that in view of our experience in the Province of Alberta in connection with professional boxing bouts which citizens generally regard as virtually prize-fights, we, the members of the Alberta conference of the Methodist church, both ministerial and lay, do most respectfully urge upon the parliament of Canada to amend, at the present session if possible, the definition of prize-fighting in the criminal code so as to include so-called boxing bouts, which have the characteristics usually

attendant upon prize-fighting which are already under the ban of the criminal code.
