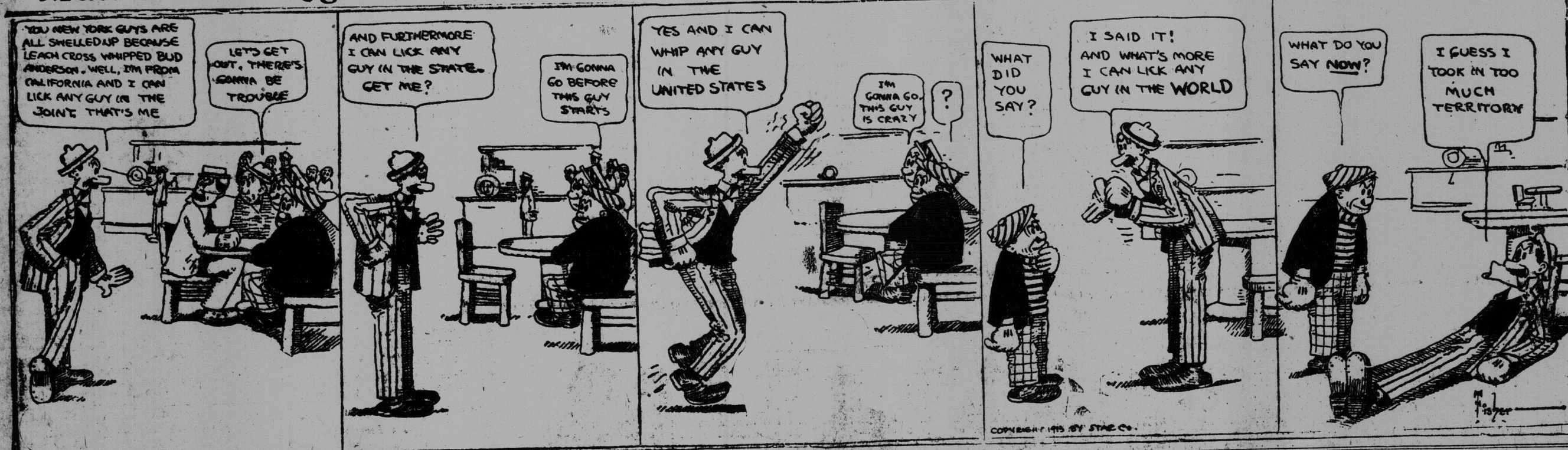


Mutt Was All Right Till He Crossed the Ocean

BANGOR WON FROM GREEKS IN ELEVENTH

Fredericton scored one run each in the first, third and sixth; St. Croix in the fourth and had already one more in the eighth with two out when the dispute took place.

In the big leagues five right fielders, Hooper of Boston, Moran of Brooklyn, Daniel of New York, Murphy of Philadelphia and Moeller of Washington are at the top of the batting list on their respective teams.

The Red Sox beat the Browns and White Sox by this score, while Washington had the big edge over the Cardinals, also beat the Cubs 9 to 0 but this was because the Murphy outfit tried to delay the game, and finally was counted out by the umpire.

Larry Lajoie ventures the prediction that in another season or two Ray Morgan of the Washington team, will be the leading second baseman in the American League.

Ty Cobb pulled the Casey stunt last Friday. He was sent in as a pinch hitter with the bases full and fanned.

C. McDonald, the Boston third baseman, is far out in front in the National League with an average of .422. Earl Yungling, the Brooklyn pitcher, is second with .409 for sixteen games.

Crane, New York, with .383; Crawth, Philadelphia, with .347; Hyatt, Pittsburgh, with .346; and Daubert, Brooklyn with .345, round out the first half dozen in the older league.

"Home run Baker," Philadelphia leads the American Leaguers in the number of round trip hits with eight. The same number is credited to Crawth and Cuncus, Philadelphia, leaders in the National, among the home run hitters.

Ancient dope shows that Yale did not make an intercollegiate record by winning 17 straight games. The Princeton team in 1897 won 17 straight and the Harvard Varsity nine of '85 put over 19 straight victories.
