LOCAL NEWS

THE VICTORIAN. The S. S. Victoria was reported at eleven o'clock last night 190 miles east of Cape Race. She is due at Quebec on Friday at noon, and at Montreal on Saturday.

WORK FINISHED. The work of repairing King street in the section which was condemned as being unsatisfactory has been about finished. The new coating is rougher in appearance than the first chippings of stone which were laid in place and it is regarded as being better suited for the purpose.

She had been ill since March. Besides her parents she is survived by two sisters, Miss Gertrude at home and Mrs. M. A. Hector at Providence, R. I. One sister, Miss Nellie Hector, died last year. Miss Hector was one of the trio of Hector sister singers who were very popular in the city. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at half past two o'clock.

FUNERAL DIRECTORS. At this morning's session of the Maritime Funeral Directors' Association demonstrations on embalming and anatomy were given by Professor Dodge. The business meeting will be held this afternoon, beginning at 2:30 o'clock. Besides the election of officers, a vote will be taken to decide whether or not the Maritime Association shall be abolished or amalgamated with the provincial association. The demonstration work will also be continued this afternoon. Two sessions will be held tomorrow, the afternoon session bringing the convention to a close.
