GENEVIEVE WARD'S WILL MADE PUBLIC

Famous Actress Bequeathed Interesting Souvenirs -£5.000 for Maid.

London, Nov. 16—(By Mail)—Dame Senevieve Ward, D. B. E., of 22, avenue oad, Regent's Park, N. W., the famous ctress, who died on August 18 last, used 85, daughter of Colonel Samuel Ward, of New York, left estate of the ross value of £9,854, with net personalty £8,876. By her will dated March 27 last she left to the National fallery, for the use of the nation, the portrait of herself by Hugh Riviere; to the Royal Academy of Music, London, the potrait of herself as "Norma;" to the Garrick Club, London, the portrait of herself as "Ninon de L'Encles," and the illuminated testimonial album presented to her in connection Satsuma vase; to Sir Frank and Lady Benson, all her silver articles and silver plate, and all her books and a book cabinet to Averil, daughter of Dr. Byres Moir, of Weymouth street, W. The testator also left £5,000, her upright plano, her wardrobe and sewing machine, and all household effects not otherwise bequeathed as she nay select to her maid, Amy Brown, "who has so faithfully and devotedly served me;" £200 to her cook, Nancy Brewer; and the balance of her furniture to the Young Women's Christian Association for hostels in London. A bequest of £500 to the Rev. Mother Superior of the Sisters of Mercy, Harewood avenue, was revoked by codicil the day before her death, the testatrix stating that the had already made a gift. All the bequests are free of duty, and residue of the property is left to Sir chaplain, John Smith, secretary, Geo.


Whiskey-Laden Ship Is Forced Into Port In Leaking Condition
