EXHALING DEADLY FUMES

MEXICO'S OIL GUSHER CONTINUES TO GIVE TROUBLE.

New Orleans, La., Oct. 28.—Deadly fumes from Mexico's great oil well fire, sixty miles from Tampico, have killed more than a score of workmen during the past few days, completely blackened the white paint on the sides of the ships, endangered commerce, and caused thousands of dollars' worth of damage to ranches and other neighboring interests, according to Captain Michael Henrichsen, of the steamship City of Mexico, which reached New Orleans Monday night. Battling to save what they could from the wreckage, American mine-owners, after spending more than a million dollars, finally succeeded in extinguishing the blaze, but even greater terrors than before prevailed then. The flames had consumed the noxious gases, but when the fire was stopped the gases burst forth. Laborers, inhaling a bit of the stuff, dropped in their tracks dead.

BODIES FOUND ON TRACK.

TWO PROBABLY VICTIMS OF RAILWAY ACCIDENTS.

London, Ont., Oct. 27.—Reports have reached here of the finding of two bodies on the G. T. R. tracks, one at Princeton and one at Cope-town. The latter body has not been identified, but is that of an Italian laborer. The former victim was Benj. Nash, an aged inmate of the House of Refuge at Woodstock. Nash was seen in Woodstock last evening, and it is thought was run down some time during the night while walking on the tracks.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even-numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may, however, be made any Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

Duties.—(1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.
(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. He may also do so by living with father or mother, on certain conditions. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.

(3) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.

TEMPERANCE THE ISSUE

ELECTIONS WILL BE FOUGHT ON LICENSE QUESTION.

Toronto, Oct. 29.—There is little doubt that the temperance question will be the chief issue at the next municipal elections in Toronto. Already it is being talked of. Some members of the City Council who voted for license reduction last winter are in favor of submitting the question of a reduction of the liquor license to the people, while others are in favor of making the issue the election, or rejection of candidates on the understanding that they would vote for reduction if returned to the Council.

The question of which of these two courses would be preferable has been discussed by the Executive of the Temperance Federation informally, but no action has yet been taken. It has been discussed by other temperance organizations without any resolution being voted upon, but it is probable that in a short time decisive action will be taken on the question by the various temperance organizations at a joint meeting.

FEW APPEALS ON ASSESSMENT

Changes in the Assessment Act Will Necessitate Adjustment of Income Tax

A meeting of the court of revision on Ingersoll's assessment roll for 1909 was held last night, all the members being present as follows: Mayor Sullivan, Deputy Reeve Fleet, Ald. Mills, Paterson and Elliott. Ald. Mills was appointed chairman.

Very few appeals were made and the court completed its work before 9.30. Between five and six thousand dollars was struck off the assessment, nearly all of this amount being income assessment, which should not have been placed on the roll by the assessor. In addition to this, it will be necessary to adjust the income assessment of many citizens. Under the assessment act, as it is to-day, single men are exempt on salary under \$700 and married men on a salary under \$1,000. Previously the amounts were, single men \$400, married men \$700. As the assessments were all made according to the last mentioned figure, it will be necessary to adjust them in accordance with the Act as it is at the present time.

WHAT HUMOR IS THIS

WORKLESS MEN MADE VICTIMS OF FAKE ADVERTISEMENT.

Toronto, Oct. 29.—Wanted — Two hundred men to pack apples; highest wages and fares to destination. Apply Simington, 15 Laurier avenue, between 1.30 and 2 p.m. Wednesday.

The foregoing alluring advertisement, inserted in two evening papers Tuesday night by some individual with a remarkable sense of the humorous, gave over a hundred men, many of them penniless and forced to spend their last few coins on car fare, a fruitless journey for work in the pouring rain yesterday.

The funny person who placed the liner in the newspapers apparently thought he was playing a good joke on Mr. E. Simington, who carried the ad at the home of Mr. G. E. McLean, 15 Laurier avenue, yesterday afternoon. The advertisement requested the applicants to call between 1.30 and 2 p.m., but the first man, poorly dressed and wet through, knocked at the door at 7.30 in the morning. The family after some difficulty convinced the disappointed man that he had been the victim of a hoax. Others continued to arrive in ones and twos in the morning, and during the time fixed in the advertisement they came in groups. Some of the later arrivals were saved the trouble of going to the door by others who stood around the front of the house in shivering, miserable groups, getting a certain amount of grim satisfaction in imparting the news of the hoax to the disappointed applicants.

Mr. McLean and the members of his family are naturally very much upset about the affair. They have a fair idea as to the perpetrator of the hoax, and the matter may be placed in the hands of the police.

GOOD ROADS IN ELGIN

WORK WILL BE UNDERTAKEN ON BASIS OF \$15,000 PER MILE.

Aymer Sun: The good roads committee of the county council met Friday evening and decided to submit a by-law to the ratepayers at the coming municipal elections to raise a sufficient sum to expend on the permanent improvement of the selected highways in the county on a basis of \$15,000 a mile. About 250 miles will be affected and divided among the several rural and village municipalities. The committee recently visited Oxford County and from their observations some of the members think that better results would follow if the amount intended to be asked for were doubled. The Government will make a grant of one-third of the sum to be expended by the county.

MINISTERS AT OTTAWA

CABINET MEETING WILL PROBABLY BE HELD TO-DAY.

Ottawa, Oct. 28.—A number of Cabinet Ministers have already returned to the city and a Cabinet meeting will probably be held to-morrow. In addition to the Premier, the Ministers now here are Hon. Geo. P. Graham, Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, Hon. L. P. Brodeur, Sir Richard Cartwright, Hon. Sydney Fisher and Hon. Chas. Murphy. Sir Wilfrid and the Ministers, after clearing up the arrears of departmental and Government business, will take a brief holiday before beginning preparations for the first session of the new Parliament. It is altogether unlikely that the members will be summoned to meet before the first or the second week in January.

Hon. Chas. Murphy's majority in Russell county is 1,193, the largest in the history of the riding. He carried some townships that never before failed to give a Tory majority, thus winning his spurs in brilliant fashion in his first election.

It is stated here that Hon. R. W. Scott, ex-Secretary of State, and Liberal leader in the Senate for many years, will probably be appointed by the Government as Speaker of the Senate in the new Parliament. No appointment would be more popular or appropriate.

In the Commons it is regarded as practically assured that Mr. Charles, Marcell, M. P., the present Deputy Speaker, will be elected to the Speakership.
