

- Q.105 How did this relief take place?
A.105 He walked into the post and I walked out.
- Q.106 Who relieved you at that time on that date?
A.106 The accused, Sir.
- Q.107 Where did you go then?
A.107 I returned to barracks.
- Q.108 What were your orders while on guard duty at No.1 A.A. Post?
A.108 To keep a sharp look-out for enemy air-craft and a close watch on the area in general.
- Q.109 Was it considered serious to leave the Post unguarded while on duty?
A.109 Yes, Sir.
- Cross-examined by the Defending Officer.
- Q.110 Had you received definite orders from your platoon commander to remain within the circle of sand-bags?
A.110 No, Sir.
- Q.111 Was it customary for the N.C.O. in charge to parade you to the Post at the start of your tour of duty?
A.111 No, Sir. It was not customary.
- Q.112 Explain to the Court the procedure followed?
A.112 We were usually warned for duty by the Platoon Commander who watched that we ~~left~~⁴³⁸ left the hut on time for duty at the Post.
- Q.113 Were orders read to each individual man prior to duty?
A.113 No, Sir.
- Q.114 Is it not true that you were allowed to walk in the vicinity of the Post while on duty?
A.114 Yes, Sir.
- ~~Exhibit~~ Re-examined by the Prosecutor.
- Q.115 You stated you were allowed to walk around the outside of Post. Would you have considered twenty five to fifty yards away from the Post allowable?
A.115 No, Sir. Just around the parapet.
- Questioned by the Court.
- Q.116 What was the dress worn on duty?
A.116 Skeleton web; Steel Helmet; Respirators at the alert.
- Q.117 Were you allowed to walk between Posts?
A.117 No, Sir.
