- Q.78 Would you say that you questioned the accused for an hour?
- A.78 I would say, this is just my own judgement it took about thirty-five minutes.
- Q.79 It is common knowledge around camp that you were in the R.C.M.P. before coming in the Army?
- A.79 Correct sir.
