

Gold stealing and silver stealing are unqualified theft, and justice demands that the thieves be punished promptly and efficaciously.

Unfortunately our statute books do not provide effective means for bringing high graders to justice. Strong representations, however, have been made to the Minister of Justice at Ottawa, and it is believed that the necessary Federal enactments will be
