BRITISH COLUMBIA SALMON

Prices Have Advanced Sixty Cents Per Case on Opening Figures.

The market for British Columbia salmon is very strong and prices since the opening figures were made public have advanced 60 per case, which is due to the failure of the pack, is being considerable smaller than was at one time expected. The demand for new pack salmon is good and considerable sales have been made recently at \$6 per case for one-pound tall's, and at \$6.50 for one-pound flats.

Tomorrow is the last day allowed to the tenants of company houses, according to the sviction notices. A large number of families are moving today. Conditions sere quiet in the strike district. State troopers continue to patrol the streets, but for the present a semblance of good feeling prevalls between the guards and strikers.
