THE PROFIT EXPERTS ON THE STAND

N. B. Government's Poultry Expert Delivers an Instructive Address—Where Farmers Have a Chance for Money.

Fredericton, April 4.—In order that all members of the House might have opportunity of attending the committee on agriculture held an evening meeting for the discussion of poultry raising and marketing. Mr. Dickson was the chair and besides the large attendance of representatives a number of other interested gentlemen attended.

Yesterday's Hearing of N. B. Telephone Co's Affairs Before Public Utilities Commission—Technical Evidence.

At the telephone inquiry yesterday the testimony of a couple of telephone experts was heard. When the hearing was resumed at 10 o'clock yesterday morning, F. H. Reid, of Chicago, consulting engineer and telephone expert, took the stand and gave expert evidence regarding the operation of a telephone system, describing mechanical devices for "speeding up" the operation. The telephone, he said, has by no means reached its final stage of development.

New Brunswick's Chance.

New Brunswick is one of the most favorably situated provinces in the world for poultry raising and also regards markets. We have not the opportunity of raising a number which is very detrimental to poultry raising in the United States, neither have we in New Brunswick that severe cold which is destructive to the industry and more each year a summer resort and the hotels and summer resorts demand unlimited quantities of eggs and poultry. This is a long while before our farmers can supply this demand.

Every farmer should keep at least one hundred hens and if they were properly looked after would produce an annual profit of \$200 to \$300. There is no way in which the farmer can earn \$200 easier than by keeping a few hens and the same attention and care will give him a branch of the farm life as is given to the other live stock, nothing would yield greater or more satisfactory returns. On the farm there is no other room for hens, and the farmer can easily raise all green food required. There is no better green food than alfalfa and every farmer who keeps hens should grow alfalfa.

He thought the best way to induce our farmers to take up poultry production as a business, was to show them the pleasant nature of the industry, the small capital investment required, and the very large and steady profits from it. He thought this could be done through poultry shows, by meetings, through the agricultural societies and in other ways. He hoped the committee would use its influence to secure for the department of agriculture a sum sufficient to promote this movement.

Mr. Jones then took up the question of marketing the product and strongly recommended the co-operative method which has proved so successful and profitable in Denmark. That small country, not so large as New Brunswick, exported last year no less than 20,000,000 dozen of eggs, valued at \$10,000,000. Mr. Jones described the co-operative method of marketing eggs and poultry adopted in Denmark and showed how it could easily and with advantage be used by the farmers of New Brunswick. He showed that about 25 per cent. of all eggs laid are wasted in passing from producer to consumer and our present methods and all of which would be saved to the farmer under the co-operative system.

EXPERTS ON THE STAND

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The probable lifetime of the telephone switchboard, depends on the extension of service and improvements, but he would not expect it to outlast four or five years more. Mr. Reid also gave a brief enumeration of the most important improvements in telephony.

Provision For Depreciation.

Regarding provision for depreciation, the witness said that in the earlier days some of the companies made no provision and have since had to substitute new equipment or go to the wall. Others had tried to avoid depreciation by keeping up the maintenance and repair, but this method has proved to be in this way. The depreciation grows at a steadily and finally increasing rate. Mere wear and tear may be provided for, but the plant will eventually become entirely obsolete or inadequate, judging from what he had seen of conditions in the St. John plant he thought the depreciation should average from 7 to 8 per cent. annually. He thought with a new installation, the depreciation would be less, but it would become much greater at the end of the period constituting the life of the equipment. It was not realized how quickly switchboards and equipment became obsolete. The witness went into detail regarding ways in which depreciation occurred, and which had been foreseen in earlier days.

The Cost Per 'Phone.

Experience has shown various ways of estimating the value of an exchange. One way is by figuring the average cost per phone. In St. John it would average from \$10 to \$12 per station. The witness knew the authors of the Jackson's report, one by reputation and the other personally. Both of them are recognized as prominent and reliable telephone experts. Their report is considered of the highest authority.

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
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
