THE DIOCESAN LADIES MEET IN FREDERICTON. Annual Meeting of Women's Auxiliary of Church of England was Opened Yesterday—Interesting Session.

Fredricton, May 3.—The eighth annual meeting of the Fredericton diocesan branch of the Women's Auxiliary of the Church of England opened at the Masonic Hall, this morning. The president, Mrs. Thomas Walker, occupied the chair and about 150 delegates were present.

At the opening of the business part of the convention, Holy Communion service was held at the cathedral where Rev. R. A. Armstrong, of St. John, addressed the delegates, his subject being, "The Love of Christ Constrains All." The presentation of the thank offering was made by the president, Mrs. Walker, and amounted to \$300, more than double the amount of last year.

The session at the Masonic Hall opened after 11 o'clock, when Mrs. F. Randolph, of this city, delivered a short address of welcome to the visiting delegates at this their first meeting in this city. Mrs. G. F. Matthew, of St. John, replied on behalf of the delegates and thanked the members of Fredericton for their courtesy.

Very Rev. Dean Schofield followed. He stated that the missionary society was the right hand of the church, and he had much pleasure in extending a welcome to the lady delegates present and to wish them every success in their efforts while here. He stated that he was leaving this afternoon for Winnipeg to attend a meeting of the missionary society there.

This afternoon following the annual address of the president, Mrs. Walker, Mrs. Williamson, of Springfield and Mrs. Fred Scovil, of St. John, were elected life members of the auxiliary.

The recording secretary's report was read by Mrs. W. B. Howard, of St. John and showed an encouraging condition of affairs. It showed that there were 1,498 members of the society in New Brunswick and that 18 new branches had been formed during the year.

Miss Brook, of Rothesay, read an interesting paper on the value of mission study. This was followed by a short discussion.

The corresponding secretary's report was read by Mrs. Chas. Coster, of St. John in the absence of Mrs. W. D. Foster. The treasurer's report which was submitted by Miss Louise Symonds and was very encouraging showed a balance to the credit of the society on April 30th last of \$2,311. The thank offering fund which was separate, amounted to \$591.63.

WESTERN EXTENSION WILL BE OFFERED AT AUCTION. Ferry Committee Decide to Try to Sell Condemned Ferry Boat and to Take Steps to Procure a New One—Lively Interchange Between Ald. Potts and the New Ferry Chairman.

The new Ferry Committee held a meeting yesterday afternoon and decided to recommend the council to sell the Western Extension next Wednesday, and instructed the superintendent to secure detailed information regarding an old American boat named the Newport, offered for sale for \$22,000, and have it ready to submit to a special meeting of the council on Friday.

A long discussion on the question of building a new boat in St. John took place, and the superintendent was instructed to submit the plans and specifications of the Ludlow to the council meeting and ask a representative of Mr. Fleming to be present and prepared to give information as to the cost, etc., of building a boat similar to the Ludlow.

Ald. Potts said the Newport looked like a good boat, but he was not sure of the quality of the material. He thought the best policy was to build a new boat. The ferry service might have to pay more money for the new boat than it would have to pay for the old one.

Ald. Potts—The Newport would cost \$40,000 altogether. The duty would be 25 per cent. If the Newport was brought here the people would laugh at her. Ald. Kierstead said that they needed an efficient boat in case something happened to the Ludlow.
