The City of Constantinople, Constantine was founded in the year 330 A. D., by the Roman Emperor Constantine the Great, and was built on the foundations of the ancient city of Byzantium.

It has been besieged 30 times, but captured only three times—by the Venetians and Crusaders in 1203 and 1291, and by Mohammed II., leader of the Turkish invaders, in 1453. From the fall of the Roman Empire

In the west until its capture by the Turks, Constantinople was the capital of the eastern empire, and the stronghold of learning and Christianity in the east.

"Constantinople" means "City of the Constantinian," or "City of Constantine." The Turkish name of the city is Istanbul, or Stambul—a corruption of the modern Greek phrase, "es tam bolin" meaning "to the city."

The Turks always heard Greeks talking of going "to town," and adopted "to town" as the name of the place. The city is divided in almost two equal parts by the Golden Horn, a narrow inlet from the Bosphorus. Over it are two rickety bridges built nearly 50 years ago. The sultan collects a toll for every vehicle crossing these bridges, and in this way realized about \$1,500 a day. The only fine buildings in the city except a few built by foreigners, are the mosques and palaces.

Toronto, Oct. 16.—The police commissioners this afternoon announced that Inspector Duncan had been dismissed from the force, but his salary continues until November 1st. In regard to the pension, it was decided in view of his good services for such a long period, he would be given full superannuation allowance, providing he pays his annual dues to the end of his thirty-year term, five and a half years away.

Inspector George Kennedy, of the morality department, has been appointed to succeed Inspector Duncan as head of the detective force, while Sergeant Alex. MacKie has been re-elected to his place as sergeant of detectives.
