

Former St. John Man Defeated in Election

Henry Hagan Loses in Running for Boston City Council. HAS DECIDED TO ASK FOR RECOUNT

Shediac Man Going Back to Post in Mexico in Spite of Gen. Villa's Threat.

Boston, Jan. 17.—Henry Hagan, a native of St. John, who was defeated Tuesday for the city council, has decided to apply for a re-count. Hagan needed less than 300 to win. His opponent received 34,306 votes and Mr. Hagan 34,040. He was the candidate of the Good Government Association and Citizens' Municipal League. His many friends regret his defeat, particularly as his record is an excellent one and that of his opponent is anything but good.

Will Give More Attention to Stock Raising

Farmers in Carleton County Seized at Perth is Destroyed. Hartland, Jan. 16.—Since the free entry of feed cattle has been established by the United States government large numbers of animals have found their way across the border from this section of the country. Only the other day forty-four head of beef cattle were shipped from Florenceville and passed through Blaine, N.B., on their way to Presque Isle for the local woods trade. This makes a total of 106 head of cattle the United States customs inspector has listed within a short time. This last shipment was valued at nearly \$1,200, there being several bulls in it. A short time ago a Presque Isle party bought a bull from Theo. Cain, of Knoxford, that weighed 3,000 pounds, and cost \$150. The dealers on the American side are scouring all parts abutting on their territory for food animals and report the supply rather meagre. The lumber camps on both sides of the line require a much larger amount of beef these days than was the case a few years ago when salt pork was the principal meat diet, for the meat who use the axe, and this makes the supply for the towns and cities more limited and very much more expensive. Almost any sort of beef "critter" will now be eagerly picked up, regardless of size, condition or price, and hustled away to the American market. In view of the great demand many farmers are now seriously considering the advisability of going into the stock raising department of their calling to a greater extent than heretofore. The potatoes will take a second place for a time, until our neighbors can find something the matter with the cattle and institute another embargo.



WILL PRESENT BILL AT THE NEXT SESSION

Newcastle Town Council to Ask for Amendment to Act—Reports for the Year Submitted.

Newcastle, Jan. 17.—The town council last night increased the salary of the two policemen and Scott Act inspectors from \$1900 a year.

The firemen's annual report showed 18 calls during 1913—44 fires and 2 false alarms. One factory, one house and one barn had been destroyed; one factory and one house badly damaged, and the other cases slight. There are 15 firemen.

The Board of Health reported 42 deaths during year and expenditure of only \$98.75. It has \$1,002.84 available and needs no appropriation for current year.

Police magistrate's report for quarter ending Dec. 31st last showed 18 cases—10 drunkenness and 8 vagrancy cases. Fines and costs collected \$94; magistrate's fees, \$54; constables fees, \$4; net gain \$36.

The year's Scott Act report showed 58 cases and a net revenue of \$1,722.10. Ald. H. H. Stuart gave notice that at next regular meeting he would move:

"That this council hereby authorize and instruct the mayor and town clerk to have a bill prepared and the necessary steps taken to have the same introduced in the legislature, and that they be supported in committee therein, asking for such amendment of any act or acts relating to the town of Newcastle as will enable the said town upon a majority vote of its qualified ratepayers voting—such vote to be taken at the time of the next town election after the passing of such bill—thereafter, and at any subsequent town election, when the same shall be de-

manded in writing by not less than 15 per cent. of the qualified ratepayers at least one month before the date of such election—

"1. Repeal the assessment on buildings and other improvements of real estate by 25 per cent. of the full value for 1914 and by an additional 25 per cent. for each of the three years immediately following.

"2. Exempt from taxation all income up to \$400.

"3. Abolish income qualification for voting and allow all persons who pay poll tax to vote, as well as those who pay any other form of tax.

"4. Exempt personal property from taxation and substitute therefor a business license.

"5. Abolish the property qualification for office of alderman.

"6. Abolish the property qualification for office of mayor."

Last year the poll tax was reduced to 50 cents, and a 50 per cent. reduction in assessment on improvements was effected by only one vote. This year there are good prospects of at least sections 1, 2 and 3 of above being adopted.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS. COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years, renewable at an annual rental of one acre. Not more than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant in any one year. In unreserved territory the tract must be staked out by the applicant in person, and personal application to the Agent or sub-Agent of Dominion Lands for the district, in all cases, is required and the rental for the first year must be paid within thirty days after filing application.

QUARTZ.—A person eighteen years of age and over, having a discovery, may locate a claim 1,000 feet by 1,000 feet for the district, in all cases, is required and the rental for the first year must be paid within thirty days after filing application.

PLACER MINING CLAIMS are 500 feet long and 100 feet wide. Entry fee, \$5. Not less than \$100 must be expended on the claim. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land after report by Homestead Inspector on application for patent.
