Police Court Cases Yesterday

Further Argument in the Sharpe Case — Magistrate Gives Warning to Talkers — Several Cases Dealt With

Further argument was heard in the police court yesterday afternoon in the case of William H. Sharpe charged with attempting to obstruct the course of justice.

W. H. Scott, counsel for the defence, contended that the proceedings brought against his client in the police court were premature, inasmuch as the children in dispute had been entrusted to the care of his client until the 8th of June and the proceedings had been instituted previous to that date. He further contended that as a man could not be punished twice for the same offence and the supreme court had taken action against his client, the case was removed from the police court's jurisdiction. He moved that the case be dismissed.

W. M. Ryan, for the Crown, held that the question as to whether there was conspiracy between counsel and prisoner was one to be decided by a jury. Habeas Corpus was not granted and the case was continued for two days for contempt of court.

In the case of Frank O'Brien charged with selling liquor without a license George H. Hughes was called as a witness. He stated that he had been arrested for drunkenness. He did not know the defendant. He was in a beer shop on Monday near the ferry. W. M. Ryan for the prosecution asked the witness if he had not stated to Inspector McAlister that on getting off the ferry he had gotten a bottle of whiskey from a stout sandy complexioned man and given the bottle to him. The witness replied that whatever statement he may have made was made while he was in a befuddled condition.

Wilson Dalton, clerk of the City Court, stated that he had been present when McAlister questioned the witness who told the inspector where and when he got the liquor describing the man who gave it to him. McAlister corroborated Dalton's evidence. He further stated that he had known the defendant for nine years and never had him before the court before. The case will be resumed at three this afternoon.

Two drunks brought before the court in the morning pleaded guilty and were remanded.

William Taylor and George Wilkins charged with breaking and entering the store of P. J. Davidson, St. Patrick street and stealing cigarettes and candy to the value of \$16 pleaded guilty and were also remanded.

The case against Dell Willis, held on suspicion of stealing cloth valued at \$1,800 from the store of E. R. Taylor, West St. John, came up again. Charles E. Driscoll gave evidence. The case was laid over for a week at the request of Sergeant Detective Power, as it is thought others are implicated in the theft. Accused was allowed out on bail of \$1,000 supplied by F. Robertson and W. C. Wilson.

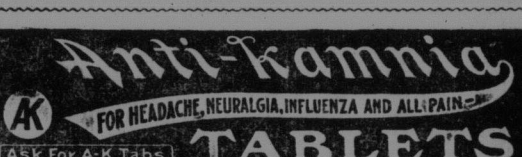
