Hibernia Lodge Officers Installed

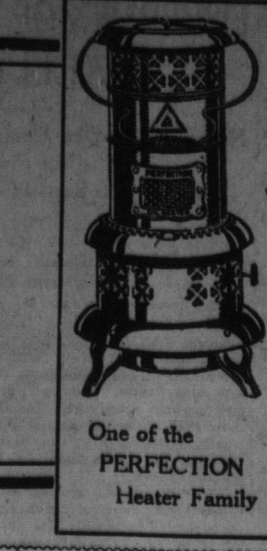
