TRAINS COLLIDE; TWO KILLED, AND WRECKAGE DESTROYED BY FIRE

Williamsport, Pa., June 16—A wreck caused by the collision of two freight trains occurred on the Philadelphia and Erie railroad near Wilcox today. J. W. Andrews, fireman, was killed and conductor Pierce, fireman Reilly and engineer Frank Holliday were badly scalded.

The wreckage caught fire and three tank cars filled with petroleum which were on one of the trains made a frightful fire.

The body of an unknown man, with both arms burned off, was found in the debris.

CHILDREN TIED AND GAGED IN THE COGS; TERRIBLE MURDER OF LITTLE GIRL AT PLYMPTON, NEAR DIGBY

Tots Were Aged Six Years and Eighteen Months Respectively—Latter Was Discovered by Search Party in Time, But Former Was Found Under Pile of Brush, Stiff—Woman, Who Had Charge of Them, Says They Were Stolen and Her House Robbed While She Was Absent Only Fifteen Minutes—Her Strange Story—She and Another Watched by Constable—The Inquest.

Digby, N. S., June 18—(Special)—One of the worst tragedies that has ever occurred in this part of the province has taken place in the quiet and pretty little village of Plympton, situated along the shores of St. Mary's Bay. The whole affair is surrounded with mystery, and the police are greatly excited and anxious to catch a word of news concerning the sad affair.

The story in brief is that two little girls, aged six years and eighteen months, respectively were bound and gagged and taken to the woods a mile distant from any house and there left to perish. The younger one was discovered at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon alive and well recovered. The other was found at 5 o'clock, dead, its body showing marked signs of decomposition.

Your correspondent, who was the first to receive the news in Digby, immediately left for the scene of the tragedy and arrived there at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. An excited crowd had already gathered around the little one and a half-story dwelling, 24 by 30, containing four rooms down stairs and an unfinished apartment up stairs.

This property is owned by Jacob Tibbets, of Boston, but for some time has been occupied by Kingsley Melanson, of Plympton, who for the past few months has had for housekeeper Hope Young, sometimes called Mary Young. She had with her the two children referred to above.

Hope Young's Story. Your correspondent found her with the little baby in her arms, and when interviewed, she appeared willing to answer questions with the exception of telling her own age. She is, however, about 22 years of age, of light complexion, probably five feet three inches in height and would weigh about 115 pounds.

She said her name was Hope Young, that she was a daughter of the late Wm. Young, of New Tasset, Digby county, and was born in that village. Several years ago she went to Boston where she married Fred Young, who, she says, was a lawyer and who has been dead more than a year.

She also said the younger child was her own and is aged eighteen months, its name being Elma Young. It is a pretty little child and did not appear to be suffering from its long exposure in the woods. It kept, however, almost continually asking for food.

The dead child was known as Mary Young. She was six years, nine months and three weeks old, but was not her own child, its mother being Mary Ward, formerly of New London (Conn.), and later of Boston, and said to be a sister of Hope Young.

The dead child had a guardian, Elmer Young, whose address was 235 Washington street, Boston, and who from time to time sent money to support the child. She having received her last letter Friday night after the children were missing.

Friday afternoon about 5 o'clock Hope Young, after doing a hard day's work, was clearing house and washing, hurried to James Bourdreaux's house, a neighbor, to exchange eggs for soap. She held the key of the house in her hand and appeared hurried and more or less excited. When asked by Mrs. Bourdreaux to remain a while she replied that she had left both children playing near the wood pile in the back yard, and with their hands on a piece of bread and molasses and also cornmeal, and she was afraid something would happen to them.

After being absent from the house about fifteen minutes, she returned and immediately, as near as could be learned last night, informed Mrs. Ambrose O'Neil, who lives directly opposite, that her children were missing. At the same time she had broken in her house during her absence and taken a \$10 bill and a 25c piece, also a revolver which she was in the habit of carrying while out walking on lonely roads, and had scattered things all round the house. She thought they had entered through a back window as it was unfastened.
