## Question No. 2,865-Mr. Clarke:

With reference to the professional and special services recorded by the Department of Industry, Trade and Commerce under the tourism program at page 32.16, volume II of the 1979-80 Public Accounts of Canada, with particular reference to hospitality, including posts abroad (a) what is a list of each contract of a value more than \$2,000 (b) are guidelines used to determine when the department will pay for hospitality and, if so, what are they (c) of the \$450,922 paid for hospitality, what percentage was principally used to entertain (i) foreign visitors (ii) Canadian businessmen (iii) provincial public servants (iv) federal public servants (v) ministerial exempt staff (vi) Members of Parliament (vii) Members of Provincial Parliaments, Legislative Assemblies and the National Assembly (viii) Canadian dignitaries, such as the Governor General and Lieutenant Governors General (ix) federal Crown corporation executives (x) provincial Crown corporation executives (xi) members of federal commissions, boards and councils (xii) any other categories (d) what percentage of the \$450,922 was used for hospitality (i) outside (ii) inside Canada?

Mr. David Berger (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of State (Small Businesses and Tourism)): In so far as the Department of Industry, Trade and Commerce is concerned:

(a) Individual payments made of a value more than \$2,000 which related to a single event were as follows:

Edmonton Klondike Days Association, Edmonton, Alta., \$2,005 and \$3,776; Calgary Convention Centre, Calgary, Alta., \$2,037.67; Le Chateau Champlain, Montreal, Que., \$2,565.20 and \$14,153.97; Convention and Tourist Bureau of Metropolitan Toronto, Toronto, Ont., \$4,000; Marriott Hotels, Chicago, Illinois, \$3,059.54; Thunderbird Motel, Bloomington, Minnesota, \$2,321.08; Hilton Hawaiian Village Hotel, Honolulu, Hawaii, \$2,292.30; Air Canada, Cherry Hill, New Jersey, \$3,527.29; Hyatt Regency Hotel, Chicago, Illinois, \$7,953.80.

- (d)(i) Fifty-one per cent. This percentage reflects only the costs incurred under the foreign service hospitality directive by the various posts abroad.
- (ii) Forty-nine per cent. This percentage reflects all other hospitality expenditures authorized by headquarters. Our accounting records do not readily allow a breakdown of hospitality costs incurred inside or outside Canada, except as described in (d)(i).

### Question No. 2,913-Mr. Clarke:

With reference to the professional and special services recorded by the Department of Transport under the Marine Transportation Services Program at page 32.39, volume II of the 1979-80 Public Accounts of Canada, with particu-

lar reference to technical personnel services (a) how does the department explain the 79 per cent increase in expenditure for the item over that for 1978-79 (b) what was the name of each type of service (c) what was the amount paid for each service and, for contracts over \$2,000, to whom was it paid?

Mr. Jesse P. Flis (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Transport): (a) The main reason for the increase over 1978-79 expenditures was the grounding of the oil tanker *Kurdistan*. A total of \$913,861 was required for oil clean-up work, surveillance, environmental and legal consultation.

(b) The department has readily available only the name and amount of contracts over \$2,000.
