DISASTROUS STORM AT SOUTH.

NEARLY THREE HUNDRED LIVES LOST.
New Orleans, August 18.
A terrible storm occurred in this city on Sunday, which lasted all day, and Tuesday evening. Its effects, however, most disastrous at Last Island, a great resort, and which our accounts report to have been entirely inundated. The building on the island is said to have swept away, and it has been positively stated that one hundred and eighty-two have been lost.

It is feared that Grand Caillon another watering place, has also been merged, and many lives lost as well as property destroyed. The corn, cotton, and crops have been incalculably injured.

ARRIVAL OF THE "ARIEL."—SIX DAYS LATER.
New Orleans, August 16, 18.
Nothing definite has yet been heard of the *Perseus*, but there has been some great loss of life there. It is reported that thirty bodies had been found on one of the islands.

It is supposed that at least ten dollars in money, in packets, fell into the hands of the pirates on Last Island, about five thousand dollars worth of baggage. The loss on the island is estimated at hundred thousand dollars.

The banks of the river at Bayou Sara, in carrying away three hundred residents, have been lost. Several vessels have been ashore at the mouth of the Mississippi. The telegraph lines have suffered severely. The loss at Caillon Island cannot fall at sixty thousand dollars. The *Louisiana*, arrived at Galveston on the 15th, picking up the cabin door of the steamer *Julia*, which vessel it is now supposed lost during the late storm.

NEW ORLEANS, AUGUST 15, P. M.

The recent storm (accounts of which were despatched this morning), also proved very destructive in this city. Several vessels lying at the wharves were more or less injured, and a number of buildings were destroyed.

From all sections of the country accounts continue to pour in of the fearful havoc that has been created. The greatest damage, however, appears to have been done at Last and Caillon Islands, though it is impossible as yet to say what accounts may come to hand from other sections.

The storm appears to have come from the Gulf, and it is not unlikely that some of the Texas ports may have suffered severely. Last Island, where the destruction of property and life was so great, is about half a day's sail from Galveston.

It is now believed that the number of lives lost by the dreadful storm of Sunday and Monday will reach half two hundred and fifty, including men, women and children, but mostly the former. At Last Island alone, one hundred and ninety dead bodies have been found, the sight of which was terrible.
