## MARKET REVIEW AND FORECAST

Toronto, Monday, Nov. 25.—Cattle now  
are in winter quarters and outside of a  
little plowing and an occasional threshing,  
farm work has settled down to the usual  
routine of chores. The quality of food gen-  
erally is good, and indications are that  
the winter make of butter will be some-  
what above the average. But even yet, it  
will not be able to supply the Ontario pro-  
vince of our own market, and New Zea-  
land butter is being contracted for at  
30.13 to 31c for butter delivered. It is  
true that the new settlers of the West  
may be expected to produce their own  
butter, and that a good part of their  
milk production is annually exported in  
the form of cheese. But even after mak-  
ing every allowance it is evident that the  
production of dairy produce is not keep-  
ing pace with the increasing demand.  
Trade conditions are reported as good  
to active. Money is scarce at 6 per cent.

**WHEAT**  
What has dropped two cents in the  
last week. The wheat available for ex-  
port at all the western centres is about  
in excess of the amount at the time it  
was general the wheat was in the  
decrease looks reasonable. War in the  
Balkans is not affecting the market to any  
great extent, but its sudden cessation

would probably be followed by lower quot-  
ations. No. 1 Northern is now quoted at  
90 1/2c; No. 2, 89 1/2c; No. 3, 88c and feed  
wheat, 67c. Ontario wheat is in  
good demand for flouring purposes at 86c  
to 90c, ranging down to 70c for poor grades.

**COARSE GRAINS**  
The most noticeable change in this mar-  
ket has been the tendency of oats to weak-  
en. The crop throughout Canada has  
been fairly good, most sections reporting  
crops that are turning out better  
than expected. Other lines are steady.  
Quotations are: Buckwheat, 55c to 56c;  
oats, C. W. No. 2, 44c; No. 3, 43c; No. 1,  
extra feed, 44c; Ontario No. 2, 35c to 37c  
outside; 40c on track here; corn, 55 1/2c to  
56c; peas, 81 1/2c to 82c and soybeans, 55c to 56c.  
Quotations at Montreal run about as fol-  
low: Corn, 66c; oats, C. W. No. 2, 44 1/2c to  
45c; No. 1, feed, 44c; local oats, 40c to 45c;  
peas, 81 1/2c to 82c; barley, malting, 56c to  
58c; feed, 61c to 62c; buckwheat, 60c to  
62c and rye, 80c to 85c.

**MILL STUFFS**  
Wheat is easier on the local market and  
shorts scarcer and a trifle higher. Local  
quotations are: Manitoba, 82c a ton;  
shorts, 82 1/2c a ton in bags. Toronto, On-  
tario bran, 82c; Ontario shorts, 82 1/2c a ton  
in bags. In Montreal the market is active  
and bran is quoted at 82c; shorts, 82 1/2c  
a ton in bags.

**HAY AND STRAW**  
Now that the rush of farm work is over,  
farmers are taking more time to market  
their crops, and receipts of hay on both  
wholesale and retail markets show an in-  
crease. Wholesalers make no price changes  
but the market is easier. Quotations are  
as follows: No. 1, 81 1/4; No. 2, 80 1/4; No. 3,  
80 1/4 to 81; baled straw, 81c to 81 1/2c.  
Hay retails on the market at 81 1/2 to 82 1/2;  
clover and mied hay, 81 1/2 to 84; straw,  
bundled, 81 1/2 to 81 3/4 and rye straw, 81c to  
82c. The market for alfalfa is: No. 1,  
81 1/4 to 81 1/2; No. 2, 81 1/2 to 81 3/4; No. 3,  
81 1/2 to 81 1/4.

**HIDES AND WOOL**  
Quotations for hides are as follows on  
country markets. Cured, 12c to 14c; green,  
12c to 15c; horse hides, 8.50c; horse skins,  
25c; calf skins, 10c to 12c; lamb skins,  
70c. Prices paid on the market here are:

No. 1, 15c; No. 2, 17c; No. 3, 15c; calf  
skins, 10c to 12c.  
Unwashed wool is quoted at 13 1/2c to  
15 1/2c; washed, 25c to 24c; rejects, 15c.

**FRUIT AND VEGETABLES**  
Wholesale quotations are as fol-  
low: Apples, barrel, 85 to 83; cranberries, bar-  
rel, 89; onions, 25c to 26c a crate. Ontario pro-  
duce are steady at 55c out of store and 50c  
in car lots. This is somewhat of a de-  
duction from last week. Receipts have been  
fairly liberal, especially from the Eastern  
provinces. New Brunswick potatoes are  
quoted at 81.10 out of store and 80c in  
car lots. Montreal quotes French Moun-  
tain at 80c to 85c car lots.  
Beans are very scarce and the Canadian  
crop is of poor quality. Prices here are  
83.00 to 84c for primes and 83.10 for hand  
picked. At Montreal, American beans are  
available at 82 1/2 a bushel.

**EGGS AND POULTRY**  
The egg situation remains the same—  
high price for fresh eggs, and most  
people contenting themselves with cold  
storage stock. Wholesale quotations are:  
No. 1, 15c; No. 2, 14c; No. 3, 13c; No. 4,  
12c and old storage, 10c to 12c. On the  
5c and 6c eggs are selling at 50c to  
55c. At Montreal prices are about two  
cents a dozen higher than a year ago.  
Soleats are quoted at 30c to 31 1/2c; No. 1,  
storage, 27c to 27 1/2c and straight receipts,  
27c.

Quotations on dressed poultry are as fol-  
low: Live chickens, 15c to 16c; fowl, 8c to  
10c; ducks, 15c to 16c; geese, 15c to 16c;  
green, 8c to 10c; dressed poultry, 30c to 32c  
higher; dressed turkeys, 23c to 24c. On the  
Farmers' Market, spring chickens re-  
tail at 15c to 20c; fowl, 14c to 16c; geese,  
15c to 17c; ducks, 20c to 22c and turkeys,  
25c to 30c.

**DAIRY PRODUCE**  
Dealers generally report that an un-  
usually good supply of both dairy and  
creamery butter is coming in. Good re-  
ceipts, however, show no tendency weak-  
en the market, and all the good dairy  
butter available is being taken up at 26c  
to 27c. Creamery prices bring 25c to 26c;  
solids, 25c to 26c and inferior, 25c to 26c.  
Choice dairy butter retails at 30c to 32c.  
The cheese situation is not so strong, new  
tins going at 14 1/2c to 15c and large at  
14 1/2c.

**HONEY**  
Wholesale quotations are: Clover honey,  
25c a lb. in 60-pound tin; 21 1/2c a lb. in  
fireproof tin; buckwheat, 8c a lb. in tin;  
7 1/2c in barrels; extra comb honey, 83c  
a dozen; No. 1, 82.50 and No. 2, 82.50 a dozen.

**LIVE STOCK**  
Receipts of cattle have been light during  
the entire week. Prices have strengthened  
somewhat, and business is much brisker.
