At Wednesday's candidates' debate a shouting match arose as members of the coalition and the existing council expressed differing opinions.

Current VP Finance Jamie van Raalte, running against Oliver for President, said that this year's debate was one of the most memorable ever.

"I think we have a lot of common issues. I don't think the Candidates have enough experience to realize that they're only in office for a year, and what can and cannot be accomplished in a year," he said, "It takes four months to learn the job."

Lautard reminded that none of the current Council had experience before they were elected.

"We haven't been sitting on our asses all year," retorted the current VP University Affairs, Anna MacDonald.

"We've been accused of sitting on our dumps for two years on some issues, but it's not because we don't want to deal with them, it's because roadblocks are thrown up, said van Raalte.

"We've been looking at it (daycare) for three months. For some people it's not been fast enough, but that's the system," he insisted.

van Raalte feels that daycare is a problem for mature students, who are not in the Student Union's constituency.

"We don't represent grads. We don't represent part-time students. I feel for them, but they're not my responsibility," he said, "That's for Campus and the GSA to deal with.'

The coalition disagrees. They indicated that a daycare would be a great opportunity for students in Education to practice teaching and a great resource on campus

the list of projects that the CfC afford to go without," said Lautard.

Another item debated was the health plan, and whether or not it

should include birth control pills. "We had a referendum on that.

It failed," said van Raalte. Lautard said it passed, albeit by a slim margin. She said that most students cannot afford to spend the money it costs per month to buy pills.

Oliver accuses the Council of allocating funds to friends and boyfriends.

"Well I don't have any boyfriends," van Raalte responded, "We allotted space for three new projects that were going on this year; Things that we felt were really important and had to get done and those people needed space to work in."

van Raalte forsees other problems which the coalition might

"How credible are they going to be when they go and talk to the administration and say 'we want this now.' That's not the way it works on this campus," he said, "Unfortunately, we get accused of playing the game. Well, sometimes you've got to tango.'

Despite the mutual criticisms coming out of this campaign, all involved feel it has increased the awareness of the issues relevant to students of UNB.
