The Secretary of the Canadian Fruit Jobbers Association, Ottawa, estimates that probably 90 per cent of the consignments to Upper and Lower Canada are consumed in the Montreal distributing area, and are not, therefore, likely to be diverted to United States ports. The balance which may be affected by the concession to the West Indies amounts to about 31 carloads, and the possible loss to Canadian ports to the handling^{charges} on this amount of freight.
