AROUND THE WORLD.

Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Stoyer, of Colorado, are visiting Mrs. Stoyer's sister, Mrs. Nelson Stringer, Second St., for a few weeks. Mr. and Mrs. Stoyer have just been married lately and are at present on their wedding tour.

Mr. Stoyer has been around the world doing dredging in all the principal old countries. He left Oregon for Belgium about four years ago, where he worked on the hydraulic dredge for about six months, then he went to France, from there he went to Switzerland, then Germany and then to Russia, where he did dredging work for the government. He was in St. Petersburg while in Russia and visited the Czar's palace. From Russia he went to England, where the dredges are made by L. W. Bates, who originally came from Chicago, but is now established in London.

He went from London on one of the dredges to India stopping first at Bombay, where he saw numbers of the famine-stricken people. From Bombay he went to Calcutta, where he stayed there for a year. While there the Lieut. Governor of Bengal came aboard the dredge several times. From India he went to China, where he was in several of the cities, including Hong Kong and Shanghai. He stopped at the Sandwich Islands for a few days, and came on the San Francisco, making the trip in about three years.

The dredges are very large and costly, the price ranging from \$150,000 to \$250,000. There is only one of the large ones in America.

Mrs. Stoyer was a Miss Goodman who lived here until about five years ago. Mr. Stoyer leaves shortly for Europe again.

NEW FACTORY

Mayor Sulman Actively Engaged in Courting Industries for Maple City.

Mayor G. W. Sulman, who is ever on the lookout for factories seeking a location, is now in communication with an American firm who are looking for a place to locate their factory.

The Mayor, on first hearing of their intention to establish a factory wrote at once to the manager and received a most gratifying reply. They are anxious to establish their business in Canada and the inducements held out by Mayor Sulman were perfectly satisfactory.

This factory will employ about 750 operators, mainly women and girls. They promise that during the first year they will employ 150 hands at splendid wages.

They have been manufacturing chiefly cuffs and collars, but they intend to also manufacture shirts. It is a business which is bound to grow and the concessions asked of the city by the company are comparatively light. They will capitalize at a stock of \$100,000.

It is a firm of national reputation and Mr. Sulman is doing all in his power to secure it for Chatham.
