the advancement of its population and Agriculture, arifing from the powerful effects of his paternal protection; bleffings which they look upon as the most folid Basis of support to it's defence and Commerce; and which the Assembly, by adopting the tax contained in the said Act, did not wish to discourage. Together with a memorial containing the reasons which induced the House to prefer the mode resorted to, in preference to a tax upon lands.

ORDERED, That Mr. Bedard, Mr. Taschereau, Mr. Beribeloi, Mr. Turgeon, Mr. Roy Portelance, Mr. Planté, Mr. Martineau, Mr. Fortin, and Mr. Lussier, do compose the faid Committee.

The order of the day for the Houfe to refolve itfelf into a Committee of the whole upon the Bill, which declares in whom is vefted the power of granting des Lettres de Terrier in this Province, being read—

The House resolved itself into the faid Committee.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair,

Mr. Le Gendre took the Chair of the Committee;

Mr. Speaker refumed the Chair,

And Mr. Le Gendre reported, that the Committee had gone through the Bill without any amendment.

On motion of Mr. Berthelot, feconded by Mr. Caron,

ORDERED, That the Bill be ingroffed.

A Bill to provide for furetics to be given in future by Sheriffs that fhall be hereafter named and appointed in this Province; was, according to order, read for the second time.
