### A NEW INVENTION.

General Warren Brings a Fine Electric

When General Warren returned yesterday from Spokane he brought with him an electric lamp that is destined to work a wonderful change in mining operations in this camp. The lamp is charged with electricity and can be easily carried. A simple pressure of a ring on one part starts up a bright light, and the battery is charged for six months and can be easily recharged. At present the cost of the lamp is \$7, but they can be easily manufactured for much less money, and the general thinks they can be made and sold for about \$1. In that case much of the discomfort of going through mines can be overcome, and a great saving in the expense of lighting be made.
