Official Investigation Newfoundland Disaster

fell in again. My brother then lay down to die.

McCarthy went to the pan, but could get no one to go with him to the steamer. He told Tuff who said he would go, and told McCarthy to come back.

Lost Sight of Her

We then lost sight of the steamer. McCarthy thought myself and brother were dead, but seeing me move, helped me up. He said the steamer was gone out of sight. He said "The Newfoundland is to the leeward. Tuff has gone to her," and I said "we'll go too."

I saw our ship myself, then about 3 or 4 miles off. Going through the pans amongst the dead men, I said "look at all the fine men, and I must say it's Abram Kean's fault."

We overtook Tuff, who said "boys if the Newfoundland keeps her light up we'll reach her to-night." Dark overtook us, the ship has no light up and we had to stay on the pan.

It was drifting then but we could see our ship. We saw a light to the westward and kept shouting but the frost was too hard to face to windward.

In the morning we saw the Newfoundland and we went for her, she was more easterly than the Bellav-

ture. On the way we met men from our ship who came to help us.

While getting lunch I asked some of the men if the whistle was blown on board. They said no, not after four o'clock. Then I went in the cabin, the Captain said: "John, it's a shocking affair." I said, "yes, Captain, if you had blown your whistle and your father didn't order us from his ship, it would never have happened."

Why He Didn't Blow

He had said the reason he did not blow his whistle was that he saw us going on board the Stephano, he did not blow his whistle after the men who returned on Tuesday got aboard. After shifting my clothes I went to the cabin again, when Jones and Bungey came, about 9.30.

Capt. Abram Kean has stated in his evidence that we did not cross the Stephano's bow, that the seals were so why did we cross her bow? We did cross her bow and then went S. W. Capt. Kean also said that he took us, the ship had no light up and that our ship lay S. E. If she took us 2 miles S. W. how did that bring us two miles nearer to the Newfoundland.

I judged the Stephano about 8 miles from our ship when we left

Tuesday a.m. If Capt. A. Kean had reported to other steel ships that we had been on board his ship and told them what direction to go I believe every man would have been picked up before midnight Tuesday. The ice was loose enough from where we struck the seals to where we put up Tuesday for any of the steel ships to get about.

Was Not Jammed

I have spoken to men from these steel ships and they all said they were not jammed on Tuesday night, one man, John Hiseock, of Carbonar, of the Bellaventure, the others I don't remember.

To the Judge—Ice might have been so tight as to prevent ships getting about and still have cracks or places where men might fall through. Have been 12 springs to the ice, the last 3 with Capt. Wes. Kean.

To Dr. Lloyd—When we were about 2 miles from the Stephano the ice became slacker and better walking, this was whelping ice. After we got aboard Capt. Kean said the seals lay ahead. My watch was set by the Newfoundland's time on Monday. I did not see the time on the Stephano On the Bellaventure on the way home I noticed I was 10 minutes fast by her time.

Early on Tuesday I saw a ring around the sun. I thought we would have rain and weather. On leaving our ship I thought we would work seals all day and stay on the Stephano at night. My master watch, Dawson, thought this and told me, I heard no one object to leave the Stephano. I did not, because I thought the second hand had made arrangements for us with Capt. Kean for us to come back for the night, as Capt. Wes. Kean gave him orders to look out for us. I didn't know we had to go to our own ship until we got on the ice.

If we had made straight for our own ship when we had left the Steph-

ano and our captain had blown the whistle, I believe we would have reached her that night. I think we would have got to our ship some time during the night if the whistle had been blowing, even after we left the seals. The whistle on our ship was not so good as those of the steel ships, but as good as most others. Up to 8 or 9 o'clock I don't think the wind blew too hard to hear our whistle.

The hearing was adjourned at 6 p.m. until 10 o'clock this morning. (To be continued)
