## Chatham Man Now is Charged It is Claimed That He Attempted to Commit Suicide.

 CHATHAM, Ont., Jan. 31—As Gideon Jewell, the Taylor Ave. carpenter, who was found partly asphyxiated at his home on Sunday was leaving the hospital after recovering he was arrested by Constable Peters on a charge of attempting to commit suicide. His trial has been set for Feb. 5th. Jewell was found in the kitchen on the floor with the gas in the stove turned on. Artificial respiration was resorted to and after an hour his breathing was restored. Jewell's wife claims that her husband had ill-treated her and threatened to cut her throat. He claims to be a veteran of the South African war.

## Botha Having A Hot Time

Must Justify Deportation of Strike Leaders Before Country.

[By Special Wire to The Courier]  
 CAPETOWN, Union of South Africa, Jan. 30—Heated altercations today marked the opening session of the parliament of the Union of South Africa, in the course of which General Louis Botha, the premier and the cabinet ministers are to be called upon to justify to the country the strong-handed methods they adopted in dealing with the recent strike of workers, ten of whose leaders were this week deported secretly to England.

Viscount Gladstone, the governor-general, in his opening speech said the declaration of martial law by the government had been an "imperative duty" but he made no reference to the deportation of the labor leaders. General Jan Christian Smuts, Minister of defence, sprang to his feet at the earliest opportunity to give notice that he would on Monday move a bill to indemnify the government for all its acts under martial law and prohibiting the return of the deported men thus raising an effective barrier to the efforts of representatives of the labor men to move the adjournment of the house in order to discuss "the surreptitious deportation of citizens without trial."

Time after time the labor members in vehement language great uproar tried to debate "the crime of kidnapping citizens" but the speaker refused to allow them to continue and finally while the din was still in progress and the labor members were shouting taunts and uttering cries of "shame" the house rose.

## Paris News

PARIS, Jan. 31—The Paris hockey team has been invited to play a series of games with the Sarcelles and Detroit teams and will make the trip the latter part of next week. An excursion is being arranged and it is expected that a large number of supporters will accompany the team.

Yesterday afternoon the ice broke up and passed out. The Grand is now clear of ice for several miles above and below Paris. Although the ice was not heavy the run of it was the closest packed in years. For fully half an hour it would have been possible to have crossed the river on the moving ice so closely was it packed in the stream. Insomnia is causing anxiety and still necessitates absolute quiet."
