NIAGARA VILLAGE WAS PROPERLY CAPTURED BY NEW REGIMENTS

Niagara-on-the-Lake, May 27.—The camp is now a hive of military industry, it is the scene of an army in the making, although many of its inhabitants are now ready for service—indeed, au revois are already being said. With the arrival of the 36th and 37th Battalions, the limit of capacity of the grounds is reached. Yesterday was spent in various forms of exercise and field work.
Early in the morning the 4th Canadian Mounted Rifles, under Col. Vaux Chadwick, and the overseas reinforcements of the 35th Battalion, under Major Eden Smith left the grounds for a field day under Major Bickford, G.S.O. and Capt. Ford Howland. The order was to capture the village, which was done to the satisfaction of the umpires.
WHOLE CAMP BUSY.
The Headquarters Staff are all on the job and everybody and everything is in his and its proper sphere of activity. The camp will continue until the fall. Units will come and go as orders are received from Ottawa. The general work now under way is in reality special training for officers; the big doings for the men will come shortly, when they will be at it night and day. The night manoeuvres will be a feature of the training.
MANY OFFERS OF HOMES.
Touching offers of homes for convalescent soldiers from Flanders have been received by Major Caldwell, C.E.O. of the Headquarters Staff. Many of those are from mothers who have sons at the front, or wives with husbands there, who want to look after the boys in the hope that somebody will treat well their own next of kin. A Toronto man has offered his home in Algonquin Park. An urgent appeal is made to local organizations of women to take up the matter, and see to it that the Canadian heroes are given comfortable homes in which to recuperate. Offers from all walks of life will not be turned down, although they will be subjected to medical inspection by the authorities. Officers have already been received from Acton, Brantford, Caledonia, Dundas, Goderich, Gananogue, Hamilton, Muskoka, Newmarket, Owen Sound, Oshawa, Sarnia, Weston, Welland and

Toronto. The Headquarters Staff is already indebted to the Social Service League, Brantford; the Women's Patriotic League and the Ladies' Reform Association of Toronto, for services rendered.
U. of T. TO REINFORCE PATS.
Col. W. R. Lang announces that the University of Toronto Overseas Company is now being recruited for the "D" Company of the 35th Battalion, which is to go as reinforcements of the Princess Patricia's.
Large numbers of telegraphic, telephone and written appeals for places on the Canadian Officers' Training Corps School to be opened next week by Colonel Lang and Major Bickford, have been received, but the applications far exceed the accommodation. For this reason it has been decided to divide the period of training, which will now be three weeks for Captains and six weeks for Lieutenants.
LIEUT.-COL. GENET TO COMMAND 38TH.
Colonel Logie, Camp Commandant, announced that Lieut.-Colonel H. A. Genet of Brantford, will command the 38th Overseas Battalion, as was reported Lieut.-Col. Genet is one of the most efficient militia officers in the division, declared the Commanding Officer, when making the announcement. He has two sons with the Canadian contingents.
Three medical officers—Lieuts. Mills, 33rd Battalion; Taylor, 36th Battalion, and Thompson, 37th Battalion—have been promoted to be captains.
Lieut.-Colonels Smith of the C. M. and McCormick of the 35th Battalion have gone to Ottawa with their field officers for 15 days' special musketry training.
HOSPITAL TO MOVE.
Private Woods of the Ammunition Park, second company, one of the spinal meningitis patients, has completely recovered, and is fit for service. He will proceed overseas for service with his unit forthwith.
The hospital at Exhibition Camp will move over here tomorrow. Eleven of the patients will go overseas, six will come here, and two will be sent to their homes in Winnipeg.

PRINCE HUMBERT ENLISTS

Turin, May 28.—Prince Humbert, Count of Salemi, son of the Princess Letitia Bonaparte and the late Duke of Aosta, who reigned for several years in Spain as King Amadeus, has volunteered as a lieutenant in a regiment of Catania cavalry and is already in camp. He is 20 years old. Prince Humbert is a half brother of the Duke of Aosta, of the Count of Turin and of the Duke of the Abruzzi. The marriage of the prince's mother, to her uncle caused a sensation in Italy when it took place.

TOOK THEIR DEPARTURE

Paris, May 28.—Non-combatants residing in French territory, occupied by the Germans, have cleared their departure by way of Switzerland into other sections of their country, says the Geneva despatch to The Petit Journal. The exodus has been checked by the provisioning of the region assured by the American relief committee. Since March 6th, 64,000 of these civilians have been repatriated through Geneva. The last party to pass through the Swiss city was composed of 75 women and children from Sedan, who were permitted to leave upon their agreement to pay their own travelling expenses.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties.—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in place of residence may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties.—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Life stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
