A CRABAPPLE PIPE.

"Did you ever hear of a crabapple pipe?" said a New Orleans man who is an ardent lover of Lady Nicotine and who possesses a collection of smoker's tools that runs all the way from a black "cuddy" of Fingal to a huge porcelain furnace that has seen service at Heidelberg. "Yes, I mean exactly what I say," he continued, "a crabapple pipe! You never heard of such a thing? Growth of French Jacobin Clubs, A Jacobin club was established at Mar seilles before the end of 1789, and within the first six months of 1790 one was organized in each of the large towns But it was after the national federation July 14, 1790, that Jacobin influence

spread most rapidly.

Then branch societies began to be or ganized all over France, and as an aid to this the club at Paris in the autumn of 1790 founded the Journal des Amis de la Constitution, of which Laclos became editor. The journal spread Jacobin club, and increased residents obin opinions and increased rapidly the organization of clubs. Before the end of the year Laclos was able to publish a list of over 120 provincial clubs. By 1791 there were nearly 400, in July of the next year this number had ficreased to 1,200, and when the republic was established excellent authority estimates the number of affiliated clubs at 26,000,

one for every commune in France, Very soon these clubs became centers of the advanced revolutionary feeling. The young radicals of the provincial towns flocked to them, and through them they controlled local politics. In Paris, Lyons, Aix and Bordeaux there were two clubs. One was composed of the more respectable and the other of the lower elements of society. The latter was always a branch of the former and in times of urgent need supplied it with richers.

BOTTLES ON THE PULPIT

Cobourg Minister Creates a Sensation.

Threatens the Hotel-keepers and De neunces the Police.

Cobourg, Ont., Jan. 8 .- Hundreds of people were turned away from the Congregational church Sunday night when the pastor, Rev. Melville Shaver, spoke of "Wrongs in Cobourg, which must be made right." The pulpit was covered with bottles of beer, whiskey, cigarettes, cigars, and tobacco, which had been purchased at local hotels and stores by small boys. The preach-er delivered a sensational address, in which he denounced the laxity of the license inspector, and declared that liquor was sold after hours and on Sunday at every hotel in town. He also denounced the local shooting gallery as an improper resort for young men, and declared gambling was rampant and on the increase. He gave nopant and on the increase. He gave toce that 27 charges of infraction of the liquor law would be laid before the police magistrate, the proprietor of the shooting gallery would be pro-ented and other charges laid. The cuted and other charges laid. hotel men are almost panic-stricken as a result of the disclosure. He re-ferned to the local police as "kidnap-ers," and urged them to do their duty.

BAN OF CHURCH FOR TWO PAPERS.

Mgr. Bruchesi Threatens Debats and Avenir for Attacking Marriage Laws.

It remains to be seen whether the papers will bow to ecclesiastical censure.




